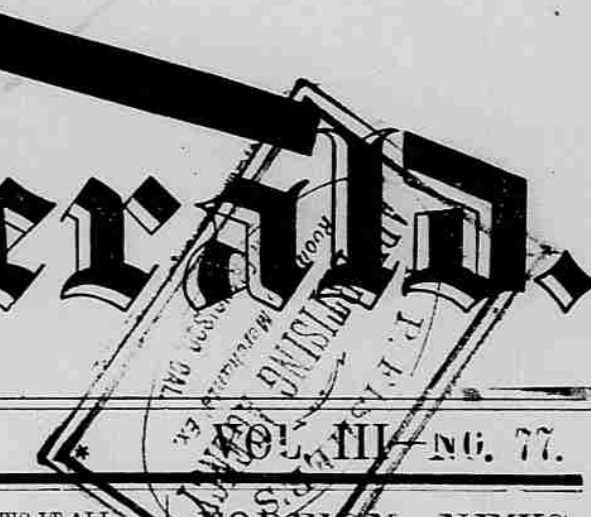

A Split to Come in the Constitutionality of License.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—

William McK. Satchell, agent for the National Anti-Licence League, is here to arrange for the beginning of a suit in the supreme court of the District of Columbia to test the constitutionality of the license system. Satchell says that similar cases are to be brought in all the states to terminate in the United States supreme court. The object is to show that license are unconstitutional. If this can be done the league expects that prohibition legislation will follow everywhere as a matter of prohibition.

A crowd gathered around the prison, and when the men emerged they were given an ovation.
