G. A. R. ENCAMPMENT.

It will convene in this City To-day—Reception to be Given To-night. The annual encampment of the G. A. R., department of Oregon, convenes in this city to-day.

Several of the delegates arrived yesterday, and many more, enough probably to swell the number to 200, will arrive to-day. The official board will hold its session at 10 a. m. to-day, and the regular business of the department will convene in the G. A. R. hall at 2 p. m.

A reception with supper will be given the visitors at their hall to-night. After the regular business session to-morrow the play, "The Veteran of 1812," will be repeated at the opera house, with additional exercises.

G. E. Calkin and wife, of Portland, Dr. J. G. Jessup, of Newport, Rollin A. Pratt, of Mohama, M. E. Olmstead and wife, of Baker City, A. A. Houston, Baker City, A. E. Borthwick, Portland, E. B. McElroy, of Salem, and many others whose names were not obtained arrived last night to attend the department encampment of the G. A. R., and W. R. C.

Return of the McKanlass Company. The public will have reason to be pleased to hear that this favorably known company of musicians will return to this city and give a performance on Saturday evening next. Their performance here last December was a clean and enjoyable one.

The professor enjoys the distinction of being the only colored graduate from the Cincinnati college of music, as well as the only colored professor of music ever in the Cincinnati public schools. As a student, he was earnest and painstaking, having a mark of nine in a maximum of ten.

For two years Professor McKanlass studied in Leipsic, giving his attention to violin, theory, harmony and composition. The professor's traveling represents sixteen years of his life, and during that time he has visited England, France and Australia. His musical specialties are new and original, his feat of playing two cornets at once, and also that of playing on eight different instruments at one and the same time, being original with him.

Taken all in all, the professor is certainly a musical genius, one who combines a natural ear for music with many years of hard study. His banjo playing is of such high order that he is justly called the king banjoist, while his handling of the violin has earned him the title of the "Negro Ole Bull." His colored specialty company has been organized for three years, and gives a first-class entertainment.

Northwest Notes. Pensions have been granted to John Fitzgerald, Lookingglass; Mary, widow of Christian Scharnhorst, East Portland. T. Cowan has been appointed postmaster at La Camas, Clark county, W. T., to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Andrew J. Clapp. Senator Mitchell has presented a memorial to the senate from the Launeymen's National association.

It showed the nature and extent of the laundry interest in the United States, and the extent to which the industry is being degraded by Chinese laundries. Senator Mitchell also presented a memorial to congress from a mass meeting recently held in San Francisco in relation to Chinese. Senator Dolph presented a petition to the senate from the citizens of Washington county, Oregon, asking for an appropriation of \$5000 to improve the Tualatin river. Senator Stewart and Senator Dolph also presented a petition from citizens of Alaska, asking for a territorial form of government, and also for suitable land laws practicable to the condition of that territory.

New Stone Pavement. Material is being placed in readiness for building a stone pavement on the front and side of the Odd Fellows temple. It is for this purpose that the large pile of gravel and dirt has been placed alongside the building, and not for the purpose of grading the streets as many conjectured yesterday. Many rods of sidewalk on First street will be replaced this season with stone pavement, giving the city a much more metropolitan appearance.

Oregon Pacific Suit. In Judge Shattuck's court yesterday morning counsel for the O. P. R. R. Co., in the suit of Nelson Bennett, to secure judgment against the company in the sum of \$551,825, moved that plaintiff's amended complaint be stricken from the files and that the cause be dismissed. The court will hear the motion next Saturday.—Portland News.

German Ball. A German ball will be given at the opera house by the German citizens of Albany and vicinity on Friday evening, March 9. General Order No. 5 Issued Last Night—New Non-Commissioned Officers. ALBANY, Or., Feb. 21, 1888. General Order No. 5.] The following roster of non-commissioned officers of "F" Co., Second Regiment, O. N. G., is hereby announced for the information of all concerned: First sergeant, T. J. Overman; second sergeant, M. E. Brink; third sergeant, J. F. Hall; fourth sergeant, A. E. Ketchum; fifth sergeant, W. E. Gillett; first corporal, F. M. French; second corporal, E. B. Parker; third corporal, R. B. Vank; fourth corporal, T. L. Wallace. They will be respected and obeyed accordingly.

In all formations of the company for drill, parades, etc. no member will be permitted to answer to roll call unless clothed in the proper uniform, nor will any member be permitted to wear his uniform unless by special permission of the commander of the company, except at military gatherings, and in going to and returning from the same, nor to hire or loan his uniform to another person to be worn at other than military gatherings. The attention of the company is directed to Sec. 7 of Art. 1 of the constitution, which provides that every member while in uniform or while wearing any portion thereof shall be responsible to the company for his conduct. No member while wearing his uniform or any portion thereof will be permitted to enter or loiter in or about any saloon or any disreputable place.

STATE DISPATCHES.

A Newspaper Company Organized to Start a New Paper at Salem. Special to the Herald.] Salem, Feb. 21.—The Capital Journal Publishing company filed to day articles of incorporation with the secretary of the state. The incorporators were N. L. Chamberlain, W. H. Byars, W. H. Parry. Capital stock \$5000. This paper will next Monday supplant the Evening Sentry, the last issue of which appeared to night.

The Deer of the Northwest. The great deer range in Northern Wisconsin, across Minnesota to Dakota, and covers the country adjacent to Brush City and Princeton and to the north of Brainerd. There are very few deer on the Red Lake Reservation, and very few about Duluth, because the wolves are so numerous in the counties adjacent. The wolves drive the deer out. At the extreme frontier the deer are found in good condition. They breed in the timber, and remain there during the summer, and are driven out by the wolves in the Fall. Between the Indians and the wolves many deer are wastefully destroyed.

It is necessary to kill the wolves to keep the deer crop, and the bounty in doing some good. But the deer are not getting exterminated. You might as well talk about exterminating the ducks, cranes, gulls, pelicans, and all kinds of water-fowl, which breed in the Peace River country. 1500 miles northwest of Winnipeg. There about 20,000 saddles of venison handled here a year. Sometimes this amount is exceeded, as in 1878, when the prairie fires got into the timber, and drove the deer into the settlements.

One firm here dresses 500 or 600 deerskins a year. The deer fur is no commercial value, but the skin is made into moccasins and into the buckskin of the stores.
