DIVORCE LAWS.

The subject of divorce is one that attracts a great deal of discussion, nearly always tinged with a vein of sarcasm—though it is too serious a matter, it would be treated with levity.

Perhaps no other subject possesses the absolute necessity of national uniformity of law as does this, and still there is more divergence and difference upon this subject than upon any other in the laws of our country.

The Chronicle mentions a case illustrating this point in a case which recently happened in New York which goes far to re-enforce the arguments of those who believe in the necessity for national laws on the subjects of marriage and divorce.

Perhaps the only way to reach this matter would be by delegating the authority to congress to enact a universal law upon the subject. Certain it is that some steps should be taken on the subject for no matter what may be our private opinion upon the question of obtaining divorce, when a man gives evidence of his desire to be a law abiding citizen by applying for and preparing a divorce in accordance with the laws of one state he should not be subject to the penalty of being declared a malefactor under the laws of another state in the same union.

We would suggest to the San Francisco Chronicle that it studies the geography of the Pacific coast sufficiently at least not to check up the mouth of the Columbia with Tillamook rock. It says: "The report of the dangerous condition of Tillamook light house at the mouth of the Columbia should be promptly investigated. If the rock is liable to give way under the shock of the huge waves that beat against it, some other locality should be selected at once. It is unjust to condemn the light-keepers to the danger of the awful death that would be their fate in case the station succumbed to the sea."

PRESIDENT SEELYE, of Amherst college, has made a study of our "Political Prospects" to determine what large moral principles the political party that hopes for permanent success must now build itself on. ABOUT STRIKES.

The following from the Alta is of course an extreme view upon the striking question, nevertheless it contains solid figures and facts for consideration: "After diligent inquiry, the cost of the Reading strike has been figured up with approximate accuracy. It has entailed a loss of \$4,000,000, distributed as follows: \$2,000,000 wages, which the miners and other employees lost by being off on a strike instead of at work; \$1,000,000 lost by the Reading company, and \$900,000 which the consumers of coal from the Reading company's mines had to pay in increased cost on account of the strike. Now who has been the gainer by this? Of course the \$2,000,000 worth of industrial force spent in idleness can never be recovered, because it has passed as completely into the realm of nothingness as if that much property built by hands had been destroyed by fire. But the loss has fallen upon those who are the least able to bear it. The cause of labor will have made a great stride forward when some other method than the cruel and abortive strike shall be agreed upon for adjusting differences between employers and employees. It is a matter for congratulation that railroad management in this state has been so prudently and equitably directed that no such disastrous strikes as have prevailed in the East have ever disturbed the industrial system here."
