G. A. R. AND W. R. C. ENCAMPMENT

The Last Day's Session of their Annual Encampment—Election of Officers.

MORNING SESSION. The encampment assembled at 8:30 A. M., and was reviewed under national inspecting officer E. B. McElroy.

The hour having arrived for special order, election of officers, it was held with the following result:

Commander—A. E. Borthwick, of Portland. Senior vice-commander—Dr. J. G. Jessup, of Newport.

Junior vice-commander—L. H. Montanye, of Albany. Medical examiner—W. W. Royal, of East Portland.

Chaplain—Rev. R. McLean, of Ashland. Council of administrators—E. B. McElroy, of Salem; F. M. Johnson, of Corvallis; E. N. Hamilton, of Eugene; H. G. Allen, of Corvallis; F. M. Miller, of Lebanon.

Delegates to national encampment—J. W. Crawford, Salem, E. H. Mix. Alternates—J. E. Ellis, Salem, B. F. Tabler, Albany.

The place of holding the next department encampment was fixed at Portland.

The following resolutions were offered at different times and adopted:

Resolved, That the bill now pending in congress to pension every honorably discharged soldier and sailor of the "war of the rebellion," at the rate of a monthly payment of one cent for each day of service, in addition to the pension for disability, meets the unqualified approval of the seventh annual encampment of the department of Oregon, G. A. R. in camp assembled.

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the representative and senators in congress, and be furnished the press for publication.

Also the following by F. M. Miller, of Lebanon: WHEREAS, The members of the last legislature, when assembled, resolved, that everything being equal, preference should be given to honorably discharged soldiers for clerkships of committees and other positions at their disposal, at said session. Therefore be it

Resolved, That said action or such utterances are made merely for partisan effect, and are being brooked at pleasure, that such action merits and deserves not only the contempt of all comrades and soldiers, but also of all honest citizens.

The committee from the department to the Women's Relief Corps reported that the corps would be ready to participate in the joint installation of officers at 3 o'clock, which proposition was adopted.

The report of the committee on resolutions was adopted.

We, the Grand Army of the Republic, assembled in the city of Albany, extend our sincere thanks for the very pleasant and pain-taking way that we have been received and entertained by the Ladies Relief Corps No. 13; and McPherson Post No. 5 of Albany.

We further extend our thanks to all transportation companies who have favored in various ways, the O. & C. R. and Oregon Pacific.

That to all of the above we owe a debt of gratitude that words fail to express, and hereby tender them a vote of thanks, as coming from the hearts of every comrade of the Grand Army of Oregon.

T. N. Hamilton resigned the position of member of the council of administration, and J. P. Darrow, of Roseburg, was elected to fill the vacancy.

A resolution was adopted, creating a committee to draft a proposed law to be submitted to the legislature, making it obligatory to appoint old soldiers to official positions, all other qualifications being equal.

Also a resolution was adopted, making it obligatory upon Posts of the Grand Army to extend every aid and assistance in their power to the Women Relief Corps.

Also a resolution to make the matter of making returns to the A. A. G. more prompt and reliable. Report of the department lodge was adopted.

The retiring assistant adjutant general was instructed to procure the printing of the proceedings. The per capita tax on members was retained at the old rate.

A resolution, endorsing the disability pension bill adopted at St. Louis, was adopted.

Report of the council of administration was adopted.

WOMEN'S RELIEF CORPS. The Women's Relief Corps met promptly at 9 o'clock, and after some discussion upon minor points proceeded to the election of officers, with the following result:

Ellis, Sec., of J. B. Matthews Corps, Forest Grove; Mrs. Fannie A. Johnson, Treas., of Ellis Corps, Corvallis; Mrs. Ellen Robbins, Chaplain, of Geo. H. Thomas Corps, Silverton.

Executive Board—Mrs. Eliza Woodin, of McPherson Corps, Albany; Mrs. Eliza Cankin, of Geo. Wright Corps, Portland; Mrs. Emma Brars, of Sedgwick Corps, Salem; Mrs. Agnes Young, of Ellsworth Corps, Corvallis; Mrs. Electric Phillips, McPherson Corps, Albany.

These officers were elected unanimously, everything passing off pleasantly and harmoniously. A committee from the G. A. R. encampment waited upon the corps and extended an invitation to repair to their hall at 3 o'clock A. M. and hold a joint installation

of the new officers. The invitation was accepted with thanks. Session adjourned until 1:30 o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION. On motion five hundred copies of the minutes were ordered printed. The following resolution was passed unanimously:

WHEREAS, The delegates and visiting members of the fourth annual department convention of the W. R. C. have been cordially received, and most amply provided for both by entertainment and in providing accommodation by McPherson Post and Relief Corps, No. 13, therefore be it

Resolved, That our most heartfelt thanks are due and hereby tendered this hospitable and generous corps and post.

Resolved, That the thanks of this convention be extended to Supt. Brandt, of the O. & C., and Supt. Hoag, of the O. P. railroads for the courtesies shown our order during the past year in granting passes to the department president.

WHEREAS, The membership of this convention of the W. R. C. recognize and appreciate the courtesies of the juvenile band of Albany in escorting the convention to their hall, therefore, be it

Resolved, That a vote of thanks be tendered the band for their kindness.

McPherson Corps was called upon by the president to exemplify the secret work of the order, which the corps proceeded to do, showing such proficiency and accuracy in the work as to gain a warm expression of approbation from the president.

The time now having arrived for the joint installation of the corps and encampment, all business was suspended and the corps proceeded under an escort to the G. A. R. hall.

JOINT SESSION. The hour having arrived for the joint installation of the officers of the Women's Relief Corps and the department of the G. A. R., Mrs. President Miller, of the Relief Corps, read a most excellent and earnest address in taking the chair, evincing that the department corps had made a wise selection for president.

Mrs. M. J. Train was then called upon and made some happy remarks on behalf of the work of the convention, which brought out a round of applause.

Mrs. Fry, the retiring president, made an earnest appeal to the members of the encampment to give greater assistance to the Relief Corps.

The retiring post commander responded, feelingly urging upon the posts the necessity of giving all the assistance in their power to the corps, stating that wherever they were found the posts were more flourishing and in better condition.

The new commander, A. Borthwick, made a few pertinent remarks and called upon Captain McLean, who responded in an able manner, after which "America" was sung by all. The Relief Corps then retired, the juvenile band at the same time giving a fine selection of music, at the foot of the stairs. Under head of good of the order the advisability of holding the annual encampment at a later period of the year was canvassed, several comrades making appropriate remarks.

A resolution donating \$20 to McPherson Post No. 5, of Albany, as the department's contribution to their building fund was adopted.

CAME TO GRIEF.

Two Swindlers Caught in an Attempt to Skip with \$60.

Two men giving their names as John Burton and Louis Handle were arraigned in Justice Humphrey's court yesterday on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. The two men appeared to be a couple of confidence men. They had obtained \$20 each from Wm. Faber, J. A. Gross and John Schlosser, by representing that they had pawned a \$200 gold watch with the Oregon Loan Co. of Portland, a certificate of which was in each instance signed over for the \$20. Each time, however, a different name was signed, and the certificates on being shown to Deputy Sheriff Humphrey were pronounced to be a great big swindle. The men were arrested as they were attempting to leave on the train and the money found in their possession. They were each held in \$500 bonds, in default of which they went to jail.
