THE GRAND ARMY.

The recent session of the G. A. R. encampment in our city brings that organization prominently before the public, and will cause many to ask what is the object of the organization.

Perhaps there will be a very few who will think that one of the objects sought after is the perpetuation of the sectional strife and differences that led to the war of the rebellion, to keep alive the animosities of the strife and perpetuate the memories that by some are termed the "bloody shirt" records.

There is but one object in the order, and that is to establish such a fraternity of feeling by the exercise of charity to all, as will promote by unity to the country, and forever protect and perpetuate our government and render useless and impossible any undue resort to arms and bloodshed in this fair land of ours.

As to the main work of the order we cannot do better than to refer to the following extract from the eloquent and able annual address of Commander M. L. Olmstead: "During the year 1887 the Grand Army, in relieving its needy and dependent comrades and their families, expended the sum of \$53,934, relieving from want more than 20,000 persons."

Why should the surviving veterans be obliged to carry this burden? They who have given so much to that country whose treasury vaults are now bursting with surplus millions, are they not entitled to relief?

"It is a fact, established beyond dispute, that by reason of our service as soldiers, the average of our lives is from five to ten years shortened; add to this our various terms of service, and we have on six to fifteen years less of life than our fellowmen in which to make our way in the world and provide not only for our own ease and comfort in our declining years, but for those dependent upon us as well, to say nothing of the shortened enjoyment of the comforts of his world, which of right belongs to us."

"When our country called us to the field we left our business relations to drift into chaos, or into the hands of rivals and stay-at-homes, and when we returned, weary and impoverished, we found the business of the country in the hands of others, who had stepped into our vacant places, and our lives became a severe struggle in adversity, and against great odds or existence upon a crowded stage of action; and amid the trials of pastoral life, forgotten in the toils of the war, the wonder is that there are now so few of us in almshouses and other institutions of public charity. Those who gave only of their substance financially to aid their country during the hard years of our service, enduring no hardships or privations, many of them, indeed, by their private peculations doing much to prolong the great struggle, have received, and are still receiving, full payment for all they ever invested—I will not say gave. And this is the reward of those who from high and pure motives embarked their lives upon the tempestuous tide of that troubled sea of time, with all that life on earth had for them to give; they received the promises of the government, worth less than fifty cents

on the dollar. Of this injustice we have a right to complain, and to which I desire to call the attention of every comrade. We are now 382,000 strong; we have promised to assist our comrades who may need help, and as we have marched shoulder to shoulder for their relief for more than twenty years, sometimes in the pride of victory, and again in the gloomy shadow of defeat, so we must continue to stand by them; we must consider now, that as the years accumulate upon us, so will the number increase among us who will fall among the needy ranks, and it becomes our duty now, while our numbers are yet sufficient to entitle us to a respectable consideration, to so influence legislation that in our old age there shall be no wail of sorrow heard from homeless, disabled veterans or their families."

The republican state central committee, in formulating the work of the approaching state and county convention, apparently were of a courageous frame of mind and, as the phrase goes, voluntarily took the bull by the horns by putting in the call the idea of a protective tariff. They simply anticipate the action of the convention, for the people are not ready to adopt direct and onerous taxation in the place of a revenue tariff, and any tariff at all is a protective tariff.
