HEAVY DAMAGE SUIT.

The Oregon Pacific Sues Contractor Hunt for \$150,000 Damages.

The Oregon Pacific railroad company through its attorneys in this city brought suit in the circuit court last evening against Contractor G. W. Hunt to recover damages to the amount of \$150,000. The complaint alleges that damages to this amount have been sustained by the non-performance of his contract on the extension of the road eastward from this city. Mr. Hunt is not in the city at present, being engaged on his Umattilla branch, but he is expected home in a few days.

Women's Rel. of Corps.

The following statistical information obtained from the notes from the president's annual report shows that the growth of the department during the past year has been steady: The corps in Oregon now numbers fifteen, with a membership of 310. \$214.65 has been dispensed in charity during the past year. \$79.50 has been turned over to posts. Balance on hand in the treasury \$328.32, which is the relief fund of the corps. On hand for current expenses \$167.25. The national department now numbers 514 corps, with a membership of 49,590 members, of these 13,904 have been added during the year, 1887. \$74.70 has been expended on charity.

CALL FOR REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

A republican convention for the state of Oregon is called to meet at the city of Portland, Oregon, on Wednesday, the 11th day of April, A. D. 1888, at 11 o'clock A. M., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following officers, to-wit: Representative in congress, three presidential electors, supreme judge and district officers, and to select six delegates to attend the national republican convention, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. The convention will consist of 209 delegates, apportioned among the several counties as follows:

Table listing delegates by county: Baker, Benton, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Coos, Crook, Curry, Douglas, Gilliam, Grant, Jackson, Josephine, Klaskan, Lake, Lane, Linn, Malheur, Marion, Morrow, Multnomah, Polk, Tillamook, Umatilla, Union, Wasco, Washington, Yamhill.

The same being one delegate at large from each county and one delegate for every 150 votes and one for every fraction over one-half thereof, cast for Hon. Binge Hermann, congressman, at the last general election. The committee recommend that the primaries be held March 31, 1888, and the county conventions April 4, 1888, unless otherwise ordered by the county central committee.

Republican electors and voters of the state, without regard to past political affiliations, who believe in the American principle of protect free labor, giving free, popular education to the masses of the people, effectually protecting all human rights in every section of our common country, and who desire to promote friendly feeling and permanent harmony throughout the state by maintaining a government pledged to these objects and principles, are cordially invited to unite in selecting delegates to the republican state convention. He is certainly a musical genius, one who combines a natural ear for music with many years of hard study. His banjo playing is of such high order that he is justly called the king banjoist, while his handling of the violin has earned him the title of the "Negro Ole Bull." STATE DISPATCHES.

Death of Dr. Carpenter--A Portland Resident Found Guilty.

Salem, Feb. 24.—Dr. H. Carpenter died at 3:20 morning, aged 61. Dr. Carpenter was the founder of the medical department of the Willamette university, and was for years dean and professor of surgery. He was the first superintendent of the state insane asylum resigning in 1886. He will be buried Sunday afternoon.

Guilty as Charged.

Portland, Feb. 24.—The jury in the case of Wm. R. Daly, returned a verdict this afternoon of guilty as charged in the indictment. Daly was charged with assault with intent to commit rape upon the person of Mrs. Ade Druet.

LEBANON DEMOCRATS ENTREE.

An enthusiastic meeting of democrats was held in Lebanon Feb. 23, 1888. A democratic club was organized with C. B. Montague as president; C. H. Ralston, E. Keebler, M. Burkhardt, F. C. Hausler, S. R. Claypool, F. M. Smith, T. J. Coyle, J. Nixon, J. Newman, A. Humphrey and M. Scott, vice-presidents; M. A. Miller, secretary. A number of committees were appointed on rules etc., to report at our next meeting. Resolutions were unanimously adopted, amid great applause endorsing G. Penney for vice-president. The club adjourned to meet again on Wednesday Feb. 29.

It is the purpose of the democrats of Lebanon to make the club a success. We hope to hear of other clubs being organized soon in the county; and we will place old Linn where it once stood, and now belongs, the banner democratic county of Oregon. M. A. M. Sec.

Petition for Railroad Extension.

A letter from Lorane, Lane county, says there is a petition in circulation in that section asking the Southern Pacific Company to extend the west side railroad from Corvallis to Drain station in Douglas county. The extended road would follow up the valley of the Long Tom river, thence from its headwaters through a gap in the Siuslaw mountain on to the Siuslaw valley; thence through to Pass creek through a gap at the head of R. K. creek, and down Pass creek to Drain station. This route was once surveyed by Ben Holladay, and, it is said, was deemed the best route, but Eugene attracted the road to the Pass creek route. This extension will require about seventy miles of railroad and will open up a fertile agricultural country to better transportation facilities, also to a valuable lumber district. The petition is in circulation from Corvallis to Drain and will be signed by all.

The State Sunday School Convention for Oregon will be held at Albany on the 22d, 23d and 24th of May. The regular time of holding would have been in March, but the executive committee have thought best to fix the time to above dates.
