ALL ABOARD FOR OREGON.

The Immigration this year to be Phenomenally Large.

The stream of immigration has begun to flow for 1888, and it promises to land a large number in the Northwest. Sunday's Northern Pacific train brought 152 immigrants and Saturday's had 125. In conversation with A. D. Charlton, assistant general passenger agent of the Northern Pacific, it was learned that the largest number of immigrants that ever visited the Northwest, will come this spring and summer. The past winter has been so severe in the East that thousands have become disgusted with the rigor of the climate, and will seek homes on the calm and mild Pacific slope. The rush will be greater, Mr. Charlton says, than it was during the Cour d'Alene mining excitement, when the Northern Pacific carried more passengers than were ever transported by a transcontinental railroad before in the same length of time.—Portland News.

The Salvation Army Trial.

The trial of the two members of the Salvation Army, arrested for violation of the city ordinance in obstructing the streets, after being told by the city marshal to move, was held in Recorder Henton's court yesterday. CALL FOR REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

A republican convention for the state of Oregon is called to meet at the city of Portland, Oregon, on Wednesday, the 11th day of April, A. D. 1888, at 11 o'clock A. M., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following officers, to-wit: Representative in congress, three presidential electors, supreme judge and district officers, and to select six delegates to attend the national republican convention, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. The convention will consist of 200 delegates, apportioned among the several counties as follows:

Table listing delegates by county: Baker, Benton, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Coos, Crook, Curry, Douglas, Gilliam, Grant, Jackson, Josephine, Klamath, Lake, Lane, Lincoln, Malheur, Marion, Morrow, Multnomah, Polk, Tillamook, Union, Umatilla, Wallowa, Washington, Yamhill.

The same being one delegate at large from each county and one delegate for every 150 votes and one for every fraction over one-half thereof, cast for Hon. Binger Hermann, congressman, at the last general election. The committee recommend that the primaries be held March 31, 1888, and the county conventions April 4, 1888, unless otherwise ordered by the county central committee.

Republican electors and voters of the state, without regard to past political affiliations, who believe in the American principle of protective tariff and dignifying American labor, giving free, popular education to the masses of the people, effectually protecting all human rights in every section of our common country, and who desire to promote friendly feeling and permanent harmony throughout the state by maintaining a government pledged to these objects and principles, are cordially invited to unite in selecting delegates to the republican state convention. 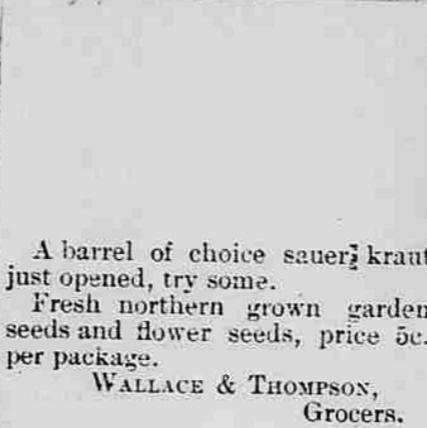
