THE STREET RAILWAY.

An Enterprise That Ought to be Encouraged by the City Council.

To-morrow evening a special session of the city council will be held to consider an ordinance on the subject of granting the right of way to an incorporated company of this city for the construction of a street railway. The proposed line is along First street, and from thence to the depot on Lyon street.

Such an enterprise is directly in the line of improvements tending to promote the growth and advancement of the city there can be no doubt. The city council, however, at its last meeting proposed amendments to the ordinance by imposing restrictions, which the members of the company state will prevent them from constructing the railway. The city of course ought to carefully guard against granting unlimited rights to any corporation, but now in the beginning of such manifestly beneficial improvements as this, the city council ought also to guard against crushing out such public improvements by imposing unnecessary restrictions. We have conversed with members of the company, Ex-mayor Weatherford and other citizens, all of whom express the hope that the council will not hesitate in giving all legitimate encouragement to this enterprise. The ordinance as amended is much more binding and grants less free rights than similar ordinances in Portland and other cities where such lines are operated. The city council is composed of progressive men, who we believe when this matter is presented to them, will not lose this enterprise down with restrictions, which will prevent the railway from being constructed.

STATE DISPATCHES.

Decision in the Hook & Meyer Case—A Bank Cashier Embezzles \$49,373.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.] SALEM, Feb. 29.—In the supreme court to-day the following decision was rendered in the matter of the administration of the co-partnership case of Hook & Meyer. Opinion by Thayer J. This was an application on the part of an administrator to sell the real property belonging to a co-partnership estate, in which several persons appeared, claiming to be heirs of the intestate, and objected to the order of sale. It is held that the question of heirship was not necessary to be determined in such a proceeding; that all that was required to be shown to obtain such an order is specified in sections, 1110, 1113, 1117, of the civil code, as published in 1874, and it mattered not who the heirs were; that the court's duty was to ascertain whether the facts as proved in said sections existed or not. It is held also that an administrator of an individual estate, when he became administrator of the co-partnership estate, had a right before he gave the undertaking, to present his personal claim against the estate to the court judge for allowance, and the latter had the right to allow it, also that an unavoidable delay in the settlement of an estate was not alone chargeable to the administrator; that the parties interested could have expedited the business by applying to the court, and that the court would have hastened it upon its own motion.

Resigned.

The Statesman says: F. A. English, book keeper at the penitentiary, has tendered his resignation, and will be succeeded by R. A. Fuller. Some time ago English took a trip to Portland, and when he returned he found Fuller in his place. Mr. Clow informing him that he had decided to dispense with his services, English carried his case to Governor Pennoyer, and insisted that an unfair advantage had been taken of him during his absence, and that the manner of his dismissal would be calculated to injure him in trying to obtain another situation. The governor, ever ready to lend an ear to the oppressed, called Mr. Clow and reproved him for dismissing Mr. English, and requested, or directed, that he be replaced, and given a chance to resign at his own sweet will, it being understood that that would be April 1st. But Mr. Clow refused English's reinstatement on those conditions; but finally agreed that the old book keeper should be allowed his position until March 1st, when he was to voluntarily resign. So Mr. English was reinstated, and Fuller returned to the penitentiary, whence Mr. Clow had originally brought him. Now English resigns, and Fuller again wields the quill.
