NOTABLE PEOPLE.

Gossip in Briefs About Them—A Pleasant Sort of Fame.

St Anthony has been dead more 1400 years but he still enjoys a yearly income of \$250,000 as "honorary lieutenant-colonel of the Brazilian army." The prior of the monastery of St. Anthony receives the saint's munificent salary for him.

"Tomah-Witch," pronounced the oldest member of the Passamaquoddy tribe of Indians in Maine, is seriously ill. He is said to be 107 years of age. He raised a good crop last year and engaged in hunting and trapping during the fall.

Perhaps one reason why Chauncey M. Depew can eat so many dinners is because he eats so little breakfast he drinks a small pitcher of hot water, eats a soft-boiled egg and a slice of toast, and winds up with a cup of tea.

One of the finest-looking foreign ministers at Washington is Colonel Emilie Fry, who represents Switzerland. He is six feet tall, with broad shoulders, and has a very attractive German face. He served under Grant during the war and was taken prisoner at the battle of Gettysburg.

Harri t Beecher Stowe is intensely interested in the ministerial work of her son, Rev. Chas. Stowe, who has a church in Hartford. Mr. Stowe is a Congregationalist, with a few Unitarian tendencies. He is a strong preacher and his mother, who is now an old and feeble woman, finds her greatest pleasure in life in listening to his sermons.

The Queen of Sweden is, by order of her physician, courageously leading a life of physical exercise and labor for the cure of that nervous malady by which she is attacked. Her majesty rises early, uses cold water for her ablutions, makes up her bedroom and goes out for a morning walk at a time when many of her subjects are asleep. The day is spent in a round of healthy and fatiguing employments.

Speaking of Mrs. Cleveland, a Washington correspondent says: "Her residence of a year and a half in Washington has not taken the edge off the curiosity of the people living right here at the capital. When she goes shopping the clerks and customers at any store she may visit drop everything to listen and look. GENERAL NEWS.

Railroad Officials Confident that the Strike is Ended.

SIX TIMES SENTENCED TO DEATH.

Legion of Honor Decoration Degradator—German Reichstag Closed—Tariff Reform—A Man's Death.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.] Chicago, March 1.—The Burlington railroad officials are more confident than ever this morning. They said that a number of freight trains in Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri and Illinois have been moved. Some through trains came in this morning, and a full suburban service is in operation. About 200 Reading engineers have arrived and are being examined to-day. Many of them have already been put to work. The men are hopeful that the strike will be settled at once.

SWUNG INTO ETERNITY.

A Murderer Hanged After Being Sentenced Six Times.

Hudson (N. Y.), March 1.—Oscar J. Beckwith was hanged at the court house this morning for the murder of Simon Vandercook, at Austerlitz, on the 10th day of January, 1882. The case has become celebrated from the fact that the condemned man has been sentenced to death six times.

GREY'S SON-IN-LAW.

He is sentenced to Two Years Imprisonment.

PARIS, March 1.—M. Wilson, son-in-law of Ex-President Grey, who has been on trial for complicity in the Legion of Honor decoration scandal, has been convicted and sentenced to two years imprisonment and to pay 3000 francs and to be deprived of his civil rights for five years.

DR. PETERS

Quarrels With the German Authorities and Returns from Africa.

BERLIN, March 1.—It is reported that the present session of the reichstag will close March 8. Dr. Peters, chief of the German African Society, has suddenly returned from East Africa. It is supposed that he quarreled with the German authorities.

SE FIG IRON DUTY.

And Other Dutiable Articles Rated Accordingly.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—The new tariff bill proposes to fix the duty on pig iron at 36 per ton on iron ore and steel railway bars weighing more than twenty-five pounds to the yard, and slabs or billets of steel, \$11 per ton; on iron or steel rails weighing not over twenty-five pounds to the yard, \$14 per ton, and on iron or steel flat rails punched, \$15 per ton. The bill provides for the admitting free of duty, after July 1, of all wools, hair of goats and other like animals. Wools on skins, woolen rags, shoddy mango waste and hocks, after October 1, 1888. It provides among other things for a 40 per cent. duty on woolen and worsted cloth, shawls and all manufactured wool, not specially enumerated, and flannels, blankets, knit goods and women's and children's dress goods, composed in part of wool.

WOMAN SHOTS HERSELF

A Young Woman Shoots Herself Through the Heart.

CHICAGO, March 1.—Mrs. H. Manice, who arrived in this city Sunday from New York, and registered at the Leland House, shot herself through the heart in her room at the hotel at 1 o'clock this morning. The case is a mysterious one and one, Mrs. Manice, who was an actress, married young Manice a year ago while the latter was traveling in charge of his tutors. Local papers say that Manice had charged his wife with adultery, and that a divorce case was pending.

Man Stabbed by a Chinaman.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 1.—A man named John Gibbs was found on the outskirts of Chinatown early this morning bleeding from a knife wound in his back. He was taken to the hospital and said he had been attacked by four Chinese, one of whom stabbed him. Two Chinamen were arrested later on suspicion and two revolvers and a blood-stained dagger found upon them. Gibbs will probably die.

Are, Rope or Ring.

Westminster Review. Manx legislators have shown more favors to women than those of other countries, for, as the writer in the Woman's Suffrage Journal says: "Although the wife did not retain separate property after marriage, the common property of the pair was not at the absolute disposal of the husband. The wife retained an indefeasible right to half of the common property on the death of her husband. Out of this right there grew a custom which allowed the wife to make a will leaving her half of

the property to whomsoever she pleased, at her own death, during the lifetime of her husband. It happened that many of these reduced to comparative poverty through the death of their wives. A decree was therefore passed restricting the power of a wife to make such a will, and limiting her right over the half of her husband's property to cases where she survives him. The same writer quotes a curious custom, which is to be found in the ancient records of Castle Mona, showing that for many centuries Manxmen have had a chivalrous regard for the rights of women. A decree in a black-letter book ordains "that if a man was proved to have wronged a maid the Deemster was to hand to her an axe, a rope and a ring, that she might deal with the recalcitraat lover. She had the choice to be slain with the axe, to hang him with the rope, or marry him with the ring. Tradition says the maids were usually lenient."

The Fatal Letter.

Julia Hawthorne's new story is called "The Fatal Letter." It is supposed she discovered it in her husband's coat-pocket six weeks after she had placed it in his hands to mail.

CALL FOR REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

A republican convention for the state of Oregon is called to meet at the city of Portland, Oregon, on Wednesday, the 11th day of April, A. D. 1888, at 11 o'clock A. M., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following officers, to-wit: Representative in congress, three presidential electors, supreme judge and district officers, and to select six delegates to attend the national republican convention, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. The convention will consist of 200 delegates, apportioned among the several counties as follows:
