ANOTHER SUIT.

Contractor G. W. Hunt Sues the Oregon Pacific for \$169,000.

In the state circuit court Wednesday G. W. Hunt, through his attorneys, Messrs. Williams & Woods began action to recover \$169,000 from the Oregon Pacific railway company.

All the minute features of the work were detailed in the contract, and owing to defendant's failure to comply with its agreement, plaintiff was compelled to discontinue operations on the 12th of December.
