RANDALL'S POSITION. In looking through the telegraphic report of Mills' tariff revision bill, which is now before congress one cannot but acknowledge that there is some good sound sense in the following remarks of the Chronicle upon the subject:

"When it comes to an understanding of matter connected with revenue and taxation, no man in the United States is clearer headed or has a better grasp of the subject than Samuel J. Randall. He knows perfectly well what some Republican protectionists do not seem to understand, that protection in the United States is a harmonious and symmetrical system, and that if one home industry is deprived of the benefits of a protective tariff, all other home industries will suffer, directly or indirectly. For this reason his methods differ widely from those of the tariff-tinkers, who seem to fancy that if they cater to a certain specified interest or locality, that is all that is necessary. He cannot be persuaded, as General Hancock is said to have believed, that the tariff is a mere local question; but he knows that it is a universal affair, made up of many and diversified interests, all of which, however, are mutually dependent and related each to the others.

"For this reason it is clear that he can never act in sympathy with the Carlisle and Mills faction whose idea of revenue reform is to put certain staple articles on the free list because certain localities or interests have asked for a removal of duties, but to leave others dutiable where there has been no great importunity for the removal or reduction of import duties. The difference between the Mills bill, as it is now said to be prepared, and such a scheme of revenue reform as Randall will formulate is almost immeasurable. The one is like the efforts of a boy in a drug store who mixes a great number of ingredients haphazard in the hope that something can be done with the mixture, although he is ignorant of the properties of the several component parts of his mixture, and knows nothing of the changes and reactions which take place in the union of the different elements. The other is the work of a skilled and trained pharmacist, who starts with a clear and definite idea of what he wants to accomplish, who is certain of every step, and who can tell with assurance not only what the medicine will be but its probable effect. Mills is a tyro and a quack. Randall is a learned chemist and physician."

"It is because Randall feels the importance of maintaining the protective system as a whole that he has consented to add articles which come into competition with California products to the dutiable list in the bill which he has prepared. He has never shown himself particularly fond of California, but he appreciates the fact that California raisins and wool must

help take care of Pennsylvania iron and other domestic products, and so he builds up his fences from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Our republican congressmen will do well to take some leaves out of Randall's book on the question of protection and learn from him that American industries, however diversified or apparently unconnected, must all stand or fall together."

SEVERAL weeks ago, in looking through the reviews, we ran across an article credited to no less a personage than Canon Taylor, of England, in which it was stated that the religion of Mohammedanism was the most successful in missionary work of all the religious beliefs of the present day. Relying upon the great reputation of the author for the truthfulness of the statement, we gave it place in our columns. It was a marvelous statement to us, for we had always supposed that the driving of the Moors from the Alhambra marked the commencement of the decadence of Islamism, and that its resurrection had never occurred. From a copy of the Christian Intelligencer, handed us by Rev. F. R. Prichard, we glean the following upon the subject, which needs no comment from us: "Canon Taylor surprised the civilized world when he maintained a few months ago at the British church congress, that Mohammedanism as a missionary organization has been and is, in some localities, more successful than Christianity. Now, Mr. R. Bosworth Smith sends to the London Times overwhelming proof that Canon Taylor cribbed botfly from a book which Mr. Smith wrote eleven years ago, including in his stealing a gross blunder which Mr. Smith had been led into, which soon turned out to be a mistake and was formally repudiated. Mr. Smith's letter nearly annihilates the canon's notorious paper.
