STATE NEWS.

Superintendent Clow Removed from the Penitentiary.

THE CAUSE OF HIS REMOVAL.

The Governor Charges Him with Using Convict Labor on His Farm, With Intent to Defraud the State.

SALEM, March 3.—For some time past it has been a well known fact that there was anything but harmony and good feeling existing between Governor Penneyer and Robert Clow, superintendent of the penitentiary under his excellency's appointment. Some time ago Superintendent Clow removed bookkeeper F. A. English for incapacity. He appealed to the governor, and having the backing of Warden McKinnon, succeeded in securing a demand for his reinstatement. Superintendent Clow refused to do so, and after some warm words the governor demanded his resignation; but before Clow could resign the matter was patched up, and it was understood that Clow would be allowed to retain his position for political reasons until after the election. The trouble between the governor and the superintendent has been growing worse every day and has been kept hot by Warden McKinnon, one of Penneyer's pets, who is an applicant for the position.

This morning the governor notified Mr. Clow that he was removed from his position, for the reason stated in the following paragraph, which was written by Private Secretary Munley and handed to the Evening Capital Journal for publication:

"Robert Clow, superintendent of the penitentiary, was removed from office to-day (Saturday) by the governor. It is understood that one of the causes of the removal is the fact that the governor had evidence that the superintendent had, in violation of the law, employed convicts to work on his farm in Polk county, and that the credit on the state for the same had not been made for some two months afterwards, and until the fact of such employment had been given publicity by the public press. This, with other reasons of a like nature, influenced the governor to cause his removal."

The Journal says editorially: Hon. Robert Clow is too well known here for any such charge to be believed. Everyone knows what is the matter. Robert Clow is too honest and faithful a servant of the people to do the dirty work to further the political prospects of Governor Penneyer or any other man. "There's a nigger in the woodpile," and that nigger is Warden McKinnon."

A Fine Horse.

Messrs Bruce McKnight & Fred Blumberg have purchased of Jay Beach, of Victoria, one of the best trotting stallions ever brought to Linn county. He is almost black, being what might be called a beautiful wine color, and it will be seen that he is a thoroughly bred trotter when it is stated that his third dam was sired by the same horse that sired the dam of Maid S. and Jay Eye See. The horse is Altogether. He is four years old, and has a 3-year-old record of 2:42. He was sired by Altamont, whose wagon record is 2:25 1/4. His dam is Maggie Arnold, bearing a 2:25 record, sired by Almont Manbrino. His second dam is Alice Drake (dam of Norman Medium 2:29, Alice Addison, 2:28 1/4, Maggie Arnold, 2:35) sired by Alexander. Norman, the well known sire of many flyers in the 2:30 list. His third dam was sired by Pilot Jr., the sire of the dams of Maid S., 2:08 1/4, and Jay Eye See, 2:10, the fastest trotters in the world. It will be seen that he has remarkably good blood in his veins, and he is certainly a magnificent horse. He will be kept in Linn county during the coming season and will form a most beneficial addition to the horse interests of the county. His adv. will be found in these columns next week.

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THE MOVEMENT TOWARD OREGON.

Albany Should Take Measures to Secure a Share of Immigration and Trade.

The severity of the almost unparalleled winter experienced in Eastern states this year, coupled with the already existing tendency of immigration toward Oregon, will bring during the coming season, it is reasonable to suppose a much larger number of people seeking homes and locations to engage in business than ever before.

In view of this fact Albany, if we desire to secure our share of this immigration, should take some measures to bring the advantages of the city and the resources of the surrounding country to the notice of our friends in the East, who in a few months will be seeking homes in our mild climate. To this end a board of trade ought to be established. Individuals are not philanthropic or patriotic enough to personally attend to matters affecting the public weal. It is an axiom old but true that what is everybody's business is nobody's business, and a board of trade organized to look after this and other matters of public interest could not but be productive of much good. Portland, Salem and Eugene each support a board of trade, composed of energetic business men, who are doing much for their respective cities. Albany has taken a healthy growth, and in order to maintain the claim of a growing business center, must put forward some exertions.

Not only should we encourage immigration, but new industries, offering employment, and something to keep people here, is needed. A fine site for woolen mills at the falls on the Santiam canal is lying neglected. This matter was agitated a few months ago, and seemed likely to result in the establishment of such an enterprise, but it has now been dropped, seemingly as if citizens of means were afraid to invest their money until they waited to see if the city is going to continue in its growth.

Albany has considerable manufacturing interests, it is true, and occasionally a new one is added, but the process is slow. Every facility is here for a manufacturing center. Opportunities have been repeatedly presented, when, had the proper encouragement been given and energy shown, paper mills, woolen mills, and other enterprises could have been established here. Now, early in the year and in the opening of spring, would be a good time to take a new start, organize a Board of Trade, give it necessary a liberal bonus to get manufacturing enterprises started, and to hasten Albany's growth toward the metropolitan business center that she must sooner or later become.
