LEBANON COUNTY REPUBLICANS.

Meeting of the Central Committee—Date of Convention and Primaries.

In accordance with the call heretofore published, the members of the Linn county republican central committee convened at the office of H. H. Hewitt, in this city, yesterday at 2 p. m.

A good representation from the various precincts was present, and harmonious action prevailed.

The meeting was organized by the election of S. S. Train, chairman, and Geo. W. Davis, secretary.

On motion of J. Wasson, the time of holding the county convention was fixed on Wednesday, April 4, and the primaries on Saturday, March 31.

On motion of Caleb Gray, the basis of representation was fixed at one delegate for each twenty-five votes cast for Binger Hermann for congressman, and one for each fraction above one-half, and one for each precinct at large.

On motion of T. Froman, the hour for holding the county convention was fixed at 10 o'clock a. m. and the hour for holding the primary meetings at 2 o'clock p. m.

A republican convention for Linn county is hereby called to meet at the court house in Albany on April 4th at 10 a. m.

For the purpose of electing delegates to the state republican convention, which convenes in Portland April 11th, and for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for the various county offices, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention.

The convention will consist of 79 delegates, appointed as follows:

- East Albany 9, West Albany 7, Harrisburg 6, Brownsville 4, Sheed 2, Lebanon 2, Scio 2, Waterloo 4, Orleans 3, Crawfordville 3, Sweet Home 2, Fox Valley 3, Center 3, Santiam 3, Franklin Butte 2, Syracuse 2, Liberty 2, Brush Creek 2, Rock Creek 2.

Total 79. The committee recommend that the primaries be held on March 31st, at 2 p. m.

Provisions were made for a thorough organization in the various precincts.

On motion, the meeting adjourned.

A Shocking Suicide.

Nay Simmons, a young man of 19, committed suicide in a most shocking manner Monday afternoon on the farm of Wm. Sappingfield, ten miles northeast of Salem, on Howell prairie.

He was plowing in a sixty-five acre field with a three-horse team, and when on the opposite side of the field east of the house, hitched two of the horses, tied a halter strap to the double tree, and making a slip noose of the other end, placed it around his neck, and then started the team, walked a few steps, and then fell down and was dragged to death.

Two young men hunting for cattle found him dead. The horses appeared to have walked about 600 yards and to have choked the life out of the young man. The cause of the deed could not be learned.

Superintendent Appointed.

Gov. Penneyer has appointed George S. Downing superintendent of the penitentiary, vice Robert Clow, removed.

Mr. Downing is a well known citizen and democrat of Marion county, having resided in the vicinity for thirty-three years.

In view of the Penneyer-McKinnon-Clow controversy his appointment will give general satisfaction. He will enter upon his position March 10.

Will Not Offer Rewards.

Governor Penneyer has informed District Attorney Belt that he will not offer the rewards for the murderers of Schuyler Ford at Harrisburg and the Chinaman at Monmouth, as asked for in petitions of Linn and Polk counties.

The reason given for his refusal is that the law does not give him the express authority to offer rewards and that his action is subject to the approval of the legislature, which may refuse to allow the bill. He says that he will only offer rewards in the most urgent cases.

ACCIDENT TO THE BENTLEY.

She Runs on a Snag and is Beached in Two Feet of Water Below Salem.

Information was received in this city yesterday that the Oregon Pacific company's steamboat the N. S. Bentley, while coming up the river early yesterday morning, ran into a sunken snag three miles below Lincoln and tore a hole in her bottom forty feet long.

She was beached in two feet of water, which prevented any damage to her cargo and prevented all danger to any of the passengers and crew.

She had on board about 150 tons of freight, including about 100 tons of flour. This will be transferred to the Wm. Hoag, which left this city yesterday afternoon, going down the river for this purpose.

FULL PARTICULARS.

SALEM, March 6. (Special)—This morning about 7 o'clock the O. P. steamer, Bentley, while running under slow bell through a place of difficult navigation about 10 miles below Salem near Lincoln, the boat struck on a snag, and such was her momentum, that a seam 40 feet long was ripped in the boat before she could free herself from the stump.

Captain Smith immediately headed the vessel for the nearest accessible point on shore, but before the vessel could reach a place of safety she sank in four feet of water, one hundred feet from shore. She had on board 100 tons of flour and 50 tons of freight which was only slightly damaged.

Captain Smith came to this city and notified headquarters and this afternoon about 3:30 the Wm. M. Hoag came down to take the freight of the damaged vessel on to Portland.

The Bentley will be bulkheaded, and will probably be ready for resumption of navigation in two or three weeks.

FIRE AT HARRISBURG.

The Postoffice and Several Other Buildings Badly Damaged.

HARRISBURG, March 6.—Fire broke out at 9 o'clock this morning in the restaurant of Mrs. Cartwright, a small wooden building, and in a few minutes the flames had spread to the adjoining buildings, consuming the remainder of the block northward, in which is situated the postoffice, J. P. Schooling's drugstore, May & Sender's warehouse and other wooden buildings.

A LATER REPORT.

The fire this morning did not burn as much as first reported. It broke out in a row of buildings on First street, between Smith and Moore streets. Four old buildings were destroyed. By hard work on the part of the citizens Butler's saloon corner and the Masonic lodge and the corner building were saved, but the loss sustained by the removal of contents will be considerable.
