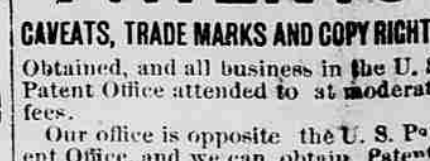

GENERAL NEWS.

President Cleveland's Message on the Chinese Question.

THE ENGINEERS' STRIKE CONTINUES

Another Passenger Train Wrecked With Fatal Results—To Appropriate \$10,000 for Sword Relics.

The Herald's Special Dispatch.]
WASHINGTON, March 8.—Today President Cleveland sent a message to the senate in regard to the bill restricting the Chinese from coming to this country, and the message concludes in the following language: Negotiations with the emperor of China for such a treaty as mentioned commenced many months ago, and has since been continued. The progress of negotiations inaugurated has heretofore been freely communicated to such members of the senate and its committee on foreign relations as sought information concerning the same. It is, however, with much gratification that I deem myself justified in expressing to the senate, in response to the resolution, the hope and expectation that the treaty will soon be concluded concerning the immigration of Chinese laborers that will meet the wants of our people, and the approbation of them to which it will be submitted for confirmation.

THE STRIKING ENGINEERS.

The Number of strikers steadily increasing.

NEW YORK, March 8.—The Manitoba road has been sold down in the stock exchange on reports that a general strike has been ordered on that road. The line is practically controlled by the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, and the strike has been expected by the officials of that company.

MORE STRIKERS.

CHICAGO, March 8.—The engineers on the Burlington, Cedar Rapids & Northern at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and the engineers on the Manitoba railroad at Minneapolis refused to handle the C. R. & Q. cars today.

To Purchase Relics.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The house to-day discussed a bill appropriating \$10,000 for the purchase of certain sword relics belonging to the widow of the late James Shields, of Missouri. The debate was prolonged until 3 o'clock when the bill passed.

THE DAIRY ASSOCIATION.

Enslaved Dairymen Bitterly Condemned by the Members.
The North Pacific Dairy Association met at the council chamber in Portland Tuesday.

After the reading of the minutes, the President Mr. Paulsen, read a very interesting and practical address, after which he invited remarks on the enslavement question.

This important matter was discussed at some length, the general tenor of the remarks being in favor of trial of this method of preserving green and succulent feed for cows in the winter time. Some of those present stated that they intended to try the plan next year.

At present there is probably not more than one or two persons in this country practicing the ensilage method of putting up feed for cows. A deep interest was manifested in the subject.

It was stated that some unscrupulous dealers were in the habit of placing inferior butter in the empty butter chests of well-known makers, which they sold to customers with the understanding that it was from the maker represented by the box.

The fraud was condemned in strong terms, and steps will be taken to have it stopped.

Considerable discussion was had on the question of food adulterations, and a pretty general feeling prevailed that the law covering adulterated butter should be extended so as to cover the general adulteration of foods.

Altogether the meeting was a very interesting one, and several new members enrolled. The society adjourned to meet on the first Friday in June next.

Dreams in Relation To Blindness.

We take it as a fundamental proposition that natural sleep is for the mind and the general nervous system rest, as wakefulness is action; and we may conveniently describe the dreaming state as an effort of the mind to express itself to crystallize its impulses in an intermediate chaos of vague restlessness. This indefinite activity, again, indicating as it does mere brooding, may be the product either of impression which force themselves on the sensorium from without, or of disturbing changes, chemical or physical, which primarily effect the cerebral centers themselves. In either variety of unrest, the mind accustomed when awake to piece together its decisions, may in its troubled repose plan and build up the "baseless fabric" of a dream. In nightmare we have an unmistakable instance of peripheral excitation, while delirium is alive with the phantasms created in a disordered sensorium. To this latter class we most fitly refer the fancies which arise out of worry or disease while the drowsy reveries of persons generally healthy may usually be ascribed to the action of some form of external irritation. A statistician who has occupied himself with this subject tells us that the blind are, on the whole, less liable to dream than the seeing; and if we assume, as we reasonably may, that the cases compared by him were those of ordinary health, we have here an observation which also, in a somewhat different sense, tends to support the peripheral view of dream causation. In saying this, we do not mean to assert that the stimulus which provokes a dream is commonly conveyed through the sense of vision, but rather that imaginative faculty which becomes abnormally active at such a time, necessarily implies, for the vividness of its creative efforts, a certain familiarity with form, color, and other objective qualities, which is to most blind persons an impossibility. The mind in them is comparatively concentrated within itself, and with the obliteration of that function which more than any other connects man with the outer world, is likely to maintain by night, as well as by day, a quietest attitude. Other senses remain, and are exaggerated, but these afford less information for the creative faculty, and are consequently less liable to become the paths of dream stimuli.

FOREIGN NEWS.

The Emperor of Germany still Alive but Unconscious.

THE SULLIVAN-MITCHELL FIGHT.

The Mill between These Two Sluggers for the Championship Pretty Certain to Occur—Canadian Affairs.

MONTREAL, 9:30 P. M., March 8.—The report of the death of the emperor of Germany, proves to have been premature. Latest advices from the palace are to the effect that he is still alive though unconscious.

SULLIVAN AND MITCHELL.

The Two Sluggers Arranging for a Contest for the Championship.

LONDON, March 8.—Mitchell accompanied by Pony Moore, Barnett Holske and fourteen others left London at 11 o'clock this morning for France, where it is supposed the fight between Mitchell and Sullivan will take place. Mitchell left before leaving that he did not know whether he would win or not. He was quite sure he would be able to show that Sullivan was not the fistic wonder that the Americans thought him. Jem. Smith missed the train and will follow him later on. Once it was a significant fact that two detectives, who have been following Sullivan, left London yesterday evening for the place where the fighters and their friends are expected to meet.

Resolutions Adopted.

TORONTO, March 8.—The inter-provincial resolution which has been debated in the Ontario legislature for several days was adopted last night. Resolutions were also produced which asked the Lieutenant-governor to transmit the resolutions to the imperial bench with the request that action be taken upon them.

Another Railway Disaster.

ESSEX, March 8.—The east-bound passenger train called "Fiver" was wrecked at Elegg last night, it is said with fatal results, the cause was a broken rail. The construction train passed here at 4 o'clock this morning with orders to rush through regardless of other trains. The train from the east is due here this morning but will be delayed at the scene of accident and may not arrive before noon, when particulars will be obtained.
