### SULLIVAN-MITCHELL

### A Very Tame Battle Between

### These Two Great Sluggers,

### WHICH IS DECIDED A DRAW.

### They Fought Thirty-nine Rounds and Both

### Get Black Eyes—Mitchell's Friends

### Claim a Great Victory.

LONDON, March 10.—Information has been received that the fight between John L. Sullivan and Mitchell, which was postponed yesterday, is now going on.

### THE PARTICULARS.

LONDON, March 10.—The battle took place at the training grounds belonging to Baron Rothschild, and lasted three hours and a quarter. It is reported that Sullivan suffered from the chill and cold rain which was falling all morning. Mitchell had trouble with his sun burned hands. The referee, after a 39th round, decided the fight a draw, and Sullivan accepted the decision. Towards the finish of the fight Mitchell improved and continued doing better before the referee declared a draw. Both men received black eyes. The police were cognizant of their movements. The fight was a desperate one, and both men received severe punishment. Sullivan was out of condition when he entered the ring and Mitchell has the best of the fight. His friends assert that he would have won had the fight been continued.

Up to the eighth round Sullivan appeared to have the best of the fight, but the fact that he could not knock Mitchell out seemed to discourage him, and after that he fought with little spirit. Mitchell showed great pluck throughout, and his friends are jubilant as the result is virtually a victory for the little Englishman. At the end of the fight both men were in poor shape and Mitchell's backers finally consented to the proposition made by Sullivan's backers, that the fight be declared a draw. The American crowd is blue and Sullivan's friends are utterly unable to explain why he did not do better. Both men's hands are in a terrible shape. Mitchell seemed to improve as the fight went on. He fought carefully and kept out of Sullivan's reach as much as possible. Betting was even at the end of the thirty-eighth round.

### THE TRUMPET OF ZION.

### A Horn Now in Existence That Was

### Blown in Solomon's Temple.

In the Royal Museum of Copenhagen there is, and has been more than 275 years, a golden trumpet, known throughout Denmark as the "Danish Horn," with engraved emblems, comprising the symbol of purity, the triple lily. Its weight is 192 ounces and it measures two foot nine inches in length. This horn is said to be a genuine trumpet of Zion. The surrounding circumstances strongly sustain the position, and up to the present time there has not been the slightest scientific doubt as to the genuineness of the relic. The lily, as a symbol of purity, was generally carried in the right hand by the vestal virgins of the temple; it also forms the emblem of the shekel, the Jewish coin. There are also discernible the much-effaced remains of what has the appearance of pomegranates, and traces of an inscription, which, as far as it can be made out, is engraved in that kind of Hebrew characters known as the Samaritan text. The emblems and inscriptions may be easily accounted for and accepted for the word "Jehovah."

The trumpet was discovered by a farmer's daughter, partly concealed in the ground, in 1630, in the diocese of Rypen, Jutland. As to how it found its way from Palestine to Denmark can only be conjectured. It is accepted as a fact that the relic at one time was one of the instruments anciently used in Solomon's Temple. Certain ornaments, and especially the beautiful engravings near the opening of the large end of the instrument, forming a turreted border around its edge, are the most convincing proofs for this position. When Titus Vespasianus, the youthful Roman General, subjugated Judea and destroyed its temple, he took the renowned tables, and seven-branch candelsticks, the "Sacred Books" and the trumpet to Rome where they were, with other trophies of victory, carried in procession through the city in honor of the conqueror. Upon the arch of Titus these things were sculptured and may be seen in Rome in a fair state of preservation to-day. The "Sacred Books," the victory presented to Joseph Flavius, the Jewish historian. Afterwards when Titus became Emperor of Rome, the instruments and tables of shew bread," by decree of the Senate and Council of Rome, were placed in the great temple of Jupiter. Between the fourth and sixth centuries Rome was overrun by hordes of northern barbarians. The city was taken, religion was destroyed, and temples regardless of their sanctity, sacred or historical, sacrilegiously plundered. After their retreat from Rome the Vandals carried off with them the spoils they had seized in the temples.

This trumpet of gold, which corresponds in every particular with the trumpets sculptured upon the "Arce of Titus" was doubtless carried to the north with the other plunder and in turn lost by the conquerors of Rome who had taken it from the conquerors of the Jews.

### BERLIN, March 10.—Regarding

the funeral and other ceremonies of the late emperor, nothing has as yet been done, as all depends on the orders of the new emperor. The will will not be opened before the emperor's arrival here, but it has transpired that the Emperor William expressed a wish that his funeral should be without any pomp. The city presented yesterday a scene of deep mourning, sorrow was depicted on every face, and the streets, especially those near Linden avenue, wore a very mournful appearance.

### Deep Sorrow Expressed.

BERLIN, March 10.—The North German Gazette says: "The deep sorrow in which the death of the emperor has sunk the German nation, casts a dark shadow, not only on our national feeling, but on the character of the whole international situation."

### Funeral Service Held.

BERLIN, March 10.—The funeral services were held over the remains of the late Emperor William in the mortuary chamber of the palace last evening. The chamber was profusely decorated with flowers. The duke of Saxe-Augusta, grand duke and grand duchess of Baden, crown prince and crown princess of Sweden, and other royal personages attended the services.

### A Quiet Dignity.

PARIS, March 15.—With a few exceptions, which met with general contempt, both newspapers and citizens here have done themselves credit by the dignity with which they received the news, and the moderation and justice with which they judge the dead emperor.

### WILL HANG FOR HIS CRIME.

### The Chief of the Bald Knobbers Sentenced to be Hanged.

SPRINGFIELD, March 10.—Bill Walker, chief of the "Bald Knobbers," has been found guilty of murder and sentenced to be hanged. The crime for which he was found guilty was the murder committed over a year ago of George Green and William Evans, who had in some way offended the "Bald Knobbers." Walker led the attack on their houses. Each was dragged from his bed and murdered before his family.

The captain demands the immediate release of Moore, who is under American protection, and who is imprisoned at Robat. He also demands satisfaction from the Moorish government for the man's illegal arrest.

ROME, March 10.—The pope has been slightly indisposed for the past two days. No serious symptoms have manifested themselves, but a certain degree of apprehension exists in consideration of his age and lassitude caused by exertions, that he was subjected to during the jubilee festivities.
