The New Emperor.

The new emperor of Germany, Frederick the Third, was born at Potsdam, October 18, 1831; married in 1858 the eldest daughter of Queen Victoria; entered the army in early life, and commanded the turning column of the Prussians, 135,000 strong, that decided the defeat of the Austrians at Sadowa in 1866. During the Franco-Prussian war he led the third army of 200,000 men and 500 guns; won the victories of Weissenburg and Worth, and bore a distinguished part in the subsequent events of the war. He was present at Sedan in August, 1870. He is an able soldier, an amiable and accomplished man, but he is domineered before many months to follow his venerable sire to the grave. Under his present condition of health he is not much better than a dying man, and will probably be actively represented in the government of Germany by his eldest son, Prince William of Prussia.
