**SCIO PROHIBITIONIST.**

SCIO, March 10.  
 TO THE EDITOR OF THE HERALD:

Pursuant to a previous notice, the prohibitionists of Scio precinct met at the city hall. The house was called to order by Mr. T. P. Goodman, and on motion Mr. J. L. Miller was elected chairman of the meeting and Mr. T. W. Bryant, secretary. The meeting then proceeded to the election of five delegates to attend the county convention of Linn county. Messrs. T. P. Goodman, T. W. Bryant, T. J. Denney, M. C. Gill and S. I. Shore placed in nomination. On motion, the secretary was instructed to cast the vote of the meeting in favor of the names in nomination. The secretary proceeded immediately to cast the vote of the meeting as directed. Mr. T. P. Goodman then suggested the propriety of organizing a prohibition club in this place. He was followed by very appropriate remarks from Messrs. B. H. Irvine, H. W. Parker, E. Weddle and T. J. Denney. On motion the secretary was instructed to take the names of those who wished to enter into an organization of this kind. It was moved to elect a president, secretary and treasurer of the club. Mr. J. L. Miller was therefore elected president, S. I. Shore secretary and E. Weddle treasurer. It was then moved to appoint a committee of three to draft constitution and by-laws for the government of this club. Messrs. Goodman, Irvine and Weddle were appointed on said committee. On motion Mr. E. F. Darby was requested to confer with Elder Webb of Salem, and if possible get him to meet with the club here at their next regular meeting, being on the 24th of March. On motion the secretary was instructed to send the proceedings of this meeting to the following named papers for publication, viz.: ALBANY HERALD, PACIFIC EXPRESS, Lebanon Express and Albany Democrat. On motion the meeting adjourned.

**He Won't Be Released.**

The Salem Statesman says: Two years or more since D. A. Richards was tried and convicted in the circuit court of Multnomah county for forgery on two indictments and was sentenced to the penitentiary for five years on one and seven on the second. Several months after his incarceration in the prison here, his case having been appealed, the supreme court was reversed, so far as his seven year sentence was concerned, and Monday this charge against him was dismissed in the circuit court. Richards therefore has to serve out the unexpired portion of his five years term, unless he is pardoned or his sentence is commuted. A Portland paper seems to have gotten a strangely distorted conception of Richards' case, for it declares that he is about to be released from the pen.

**Street Railway.**

Frank E. Allen and A. D. Barker will leave this morning for Portland where they will remain a few days to make investigation regarding material and approved method of constructing street railways, preparatory to engaging in work upon their line in this city. Mr. Allen states that it is the intention of the company to go forward with the work at an early date.

 Dr. G. W. Gray was nominated for representative, but his name was dropped when it was learned that he is not a third party man.  
 T. P. Goodman in a red hot speech said that the people of the "Forks of the Santiam" used to take whisky straight and vote the democratic ticket straight, but that "they haven't for a long time now."

A prominent delegate said on subject of importing eastern oranges for the coming campaign, that he did not particularly care to hear St. John, but he would just like to see the man who defeated Blaine.

**OREGON IN CONGRESS.**

The Mail Service Between Albany and Lebanon—Notes of Local Interest.

In compliance with a petition of citizens of Albany and Lebanon for a direct mail service, Representative Hermann called upon the postmaster general to request that terminal service at Lebanon and Albany, Oregon, be put on. He stated that the O. & C. railroad had given notice that it would carry mail between those points but would not supply postoffices from the depot. Postmaster General Dickinson stated that there was but one place in the country where terminal facilities were afforded in a place of that character, but he would take the request into consideration.  
 The postoffice at Little Elk, Benton county, Oregon, will be known hereafter as Eddyville, the name having been changed. Israel Eddy is postmaster at that office.
