GENERAL NEWS:

Widespread Devastation Caused by the Storm.

MANY VESSELS DRIVEN TO PIECES
Scores of People Killed—The Railroad Strike Still Unsettled—Newsp Notes from East of the Rockies.

The Herald's Special Dispatches [BALTIMORE, March 17.—It is impossible as yet to estimate the full damage of the storm upon the Chesapeake, but from data at hand between 100 and 200 vessels were either cast ashore or sunk, from thirty to forty were wrecked, and probably thirty people were drowned. Most of the vessels were oyster schooners. The inundations of the low lands of Maryland, Delaware and the Virginia peninsula have caused great loss. On the eastern shore people were obliged to live in attics, and in one region vessels were carried 500 feet inland.

SIMPY A BIG SCORE.
The Reports that Other Roads Would be Called Out Enroute.

KANSAS CITY, March 17.—Chairman Carroll, of the union grievance committee, admitted this morning that the reports which he gave to the associated press yesterday were untrue and had been given simply to create a scare throughout the United States. There was no truth in the statement that the roads would be called out one each day. This morning there was a large defection among the Santa Fe strikers, which was the result of a warm fight in the session of committees held last night. At the meeting sixteen of the engineers said it was their intention to go to work to-day on the Santa Fe. At this there was a great stir among the engineers, and for the first time since the beginning of the strike the members of the committee are out among the men pleading their cause. On the Fort Scott road everything moves smoothly and there is no indication of trouble anywhere. The Missouri Pacific and Union Pacific officials say they anticipate no trouble, and have made no arrangements looking towards a strike. Assistant General Superintendent Spoor, of the Santa Fe, says that his road will be running in good order before night, as a number of men have announced their intention of returning to their cabs when called upon. The engineers will not talk, and those who are managing strike were very disconsolate over their trouble.

Chairman Hochkins, of Gulf Grievance committee, was very noncommittal in regard to matters under his jurisdiction, but stated that no strike had been ordered as yet on the Gulf. At 10 o'clock this morning the Fort Scott & Gulf trains were all moving promptly and with regularity. The situation on the Santa Fe is unchanged and there is no switching being done in the yards. Chairman Carroll speaking in regard to the published reports of the financial strength of the Brotherhood said: "It is true there is about three hundred thousand dollars in a contingent fund, but in addition we have a building fund in our treasury amounting to at least five hundred and sixty thousand dollars, these can be used to pay the expenses of the strike. There are 27,500 members in good standing, and each of them can put in a hundred dollars at a moment's notice. You can see we would then have \$361,000 for fighting purposes."

The News Confirmed.
London, March 17.—The steamer Oceanic arrived from Hong Kong and Yokohama this morning with China papers which confirm the disastrous earthquake reports in the provinces of Hunan and Szechuen. Several cities were destroyed and 20,000 lives lost.

Ontario Politics.
TORONTO, Ont., March 17.—The legislature last night passed to its second reading a bill to establish womanhood suffrage for elections in Ontario. If passed this virtually makes it a law. These will be prorogued Thursday.

Senator J. H. MITCHELL
Denounces the New Chinese Treaty and says it is a Farce.

WASHINGTON, March 16.—It is the universal opinion that the new Chinese treaty will not accomplish the purpose for which it is designed and will not give the relief which the people on the Pacific coast are entitled to expect. Nothing saves the absolute exclusion of all Chinese laborers will meet the emergency with which for years past Californians have been obliged to contend.

Senator Mitchell, whose bill proposes to abrogate all treaty stipulations allowing the coming of Chinese laborer to America, thinks any such treaty as reported to be negotiated is simply a farce. Representative Fetton, whose bill proposed to prevent the coming of the Chinese government of the determination of the United States in the premises, thinks that the proposed treaty will be entirely inadequate and insufficient. Representative Morrow, who, as a member of the House Committee on Foreign Affairs, is especially interested in anti-Chinese legislation, said in his opinion the new treaty will not accomplish what Secretary Bayard thinks it will do.

Scientific Scraps.
The Chinese boast of a series of eclipses, recorded in the annals of the nation, extending over a period of nearly 3,900 years, all of which, they affirm, were not only observed, but were calculated and figured in advance. The golden age of Chinese astronomy was from about 2857 to 480 B. C.

The Bo tree of Amarapura, in Burmah, is about 2,170 years old, and it can be traced in historic documents as far back as 182 A. D. Other trees are believed to be older—African and Californian specimens being computed at 5,000 years—but there is no certain evidence of it.

The largest secondary battery yet constructed is probably that in the basement of the City Hall of Paris. It includes 165 gigantic elements, ten inches in diameter and 31 inches in height, and it yields a power of 100 horses. It weighs 11 tons, and contains 975 gallons of liquid. Its purpose is to regulate the 2,200 Edison lamps that light the hall of Petes and the adjacent salons, the contract requiring that that the battery shall keep up the light from 20 to 30 minutes in case of accidental stoppage of the machines. The current-producing machines for this part of the illumination alone are three large Gramme dynamos and four steam engines, of a total power of 130 horses.
