EDITORIAL NOTES.

A GREEN looking countryman lately floated down the Cumberland river on a fine looking black walnut log, which he disposed of at a fabulous price, walnut timber being now one of the scarce and high-priced articles. When the purchaser removed the log from the water it was found to have grown on a sycamore stump, and had been decorated with an ornamental but fictitious black walnut bark. That countryman's greenness was like the bark to the log—pat on for the occasion.

ALL of the efforts to suppress the vice of Mormonism seems to only curtail but not end polygamy. The Chronicle thinks that the doom of Mormonism is sealed, but the polygamist appears to pursue the even tenor of his way. The dispatches nearly every day report the capture of some Mormon against whom warrants are out for illegal cohabitation. The stubbornness of these people has filled the jails with offenders, but it is doubtful whether any of those who wanted to save themselves from prison really mean to keep their pledges. The only hope of the Mormonism now lies in statehood, if by the aid of the democrats they can gain admittance to the union, polygamy will flourish and the gentile will be unceremoniously thrown out.

THE German claim that the Bell telephone invention had been anticipated by an inventor in that country does not seem to influence the decision of the supreme court of this country. In a recent decision the court says that in considering the question of alleged anticipation of Bell's invention of the telephone by Reis in Germany, the court holds that Reis discovered a means of transmitting musical tones and nothing more. Bell's patent being for the process or art of transmitting speech, would have been just as valid if he had used the apparatus of Reis in developing it. The court holds that the apparatus of Reis was not successful in transmitting speech, and that his invention was not in any respect an anticipation of the discovery of Bell.

THE believers in the one or gold standard for a circulating medium are strenuous and unrelenting in their efforts to enforce their one sided ideas. One of their industrious writers is David A. Wells, whose latest attempt is to show that the fall in prices is the direct result of admitting silver as one of the standards of measures of value. The Chronicle points out Mr. Wells' mistake, which it believed was peculiar to those who discussed the money question from the monometallic standpoint; but it appears that men who fancy they are bimetallists are just as much astray. The trouble with both classes of disputants is that they are ignorant of the fact—or disregard it—that when the metals are used as money, it is only quantity which determines value, and not the extent to which they are employed in facilitating exchanges. Thus all of the vast commercial

transactions of New York might be balanced daily in her clearing-house without the intervention of more than a single metal dollar, and the minor business of retailing be carried on entirely with national bank or treasury notes. Still, so long as gold, or gold and silver combined, are the standard of value, the amount which reposes in the United States treasury, in the banks, and, in fact, the whole body of precious metals in the world available for money, would do the work of determining prices. In other words, the quantity of gold and silver, and not the everyday use to which they are put, is what determines values.

THE Oregonian says: "It will be noted that Capt. Charles F. Powell, engineer in charge of the government work at the Cascades, and always an earnest advocate of the Columbia river improvement, has given up hope of an open river in a reasonable time, under the governmental method of making appropriations. He has officially recommended the building of a portage system for use during the period of construction of canals and locks at the Cascades and at The Dalles. This we are convinced is the only reasonable hope at this time. And further, it would be money in the pockets of our people to build the portage system rather than to wait upon congress to provide appropriations for it."

THE U. S. supreme court has recently decided several cases bearing upon the liquor traffic business. One of the decisions involves the validity of a statute of Iowa, forbidding a railroad company to bring intoxicating liquor into that state, unless such company has been furnished with a certificate from the county auditor of the county to which the liquor is to be transported, showing that the consignee is legally authorized to sell it. The court holds that power to regulate or forbid the sale of a commodity, after it has been brought into the state, does not carry with it the right and power to prevent its introduction by transportation from another state. The section of the Iowa statute of April 5, 1886, which prohibits railroad companies from bringing liquor into the state is therefore declared to be invalid, and the judgment of the United States circuit court for the northern district of Illinois is sustained, the chief justice and justices Gray and Harlan dissenting.
