It was announced that the government tug Gen. Wright, had wrecked on her trip from Yaquina City to Portland, but it has since been learned that the wrecked steamer had no masts and had a pilot house. This is proof that it was not the government steamer. Besides, news was received in Portland that the Gen. Wright had not sailed from Yaquina up to Saturday morning last.

The Miltonian of Milton, Penn., says: "On Tuesday last Mr. Lewis Viereck returned to his home in Albany, Oregon, after spending the winter with friends in this neighborhood. He has abandoned the barber shop and will go into a much more profitable business better suited to his talents. That abundant prosperity may attend him in his undertaking is the wish of all who know him." Mr. Viereck expects to engage in the manufacture of self-wringing mops in this city.

Great Destruction of Timber.

The Oregonian says Mr. J. M. Bernhardt, special timber agent, who has for some time been inspecting timber land in Tillamook county, arrived in Portland Tuesday. He came across the mountains on horseback, and reports the road free from snow except about fifty feet in one place, but there are a number of trees across the track, which is still very muddy, and no attempt will be made to cross with wagons for six weeks yet. Mr. Bernhardt was much surprised to see the great ravages which have been committed by fire in timber of the Coast range. He explored seven townships of timber on the Trask and Wilson rivers, and from the top of the range looked away across miles and miles of charred stumps reaching clear to the Nestucca. He was told by an old settler that on account of a quarrel between two men twenty-five years ago, about some rails which one had cut and which the other claimed were split too small, the rails were set on fire and they set the forest on fire, and the outcome was that four townships or 144 square miles of timber was destroyed.

Work suspended.

It is a matter much to be regretted that the government works at the Yaquina bay have been forced to shut down. The appropriation has been exhausted and all government improvements for the present have been suspended. The laborers have been discharged and the government tug boat General Wright has sailed for Portland. The Newport News very appropriately says: "We are sorry to see the work stop now, as the season advances when the work could be done to such good advantage. We hope, however, to secure another appropriation at an early day. The loss incurred by allowing the work already done to be injured by lack of money to finish the work; the expense of housing the machinery alone, is a great one that should not have to be done until the jetty is finished."

THE FIRE BELL.

A Small Blaze Which the Prompt Fire Boys Quickly Extinguished.

Yesterday afternoon a fire alarm was sounded, and before the bell had fairly begun its ringing three fire companies were speeding down the street toward fire which was located by the dense columns of smoke now rising from the roof of the residence of Chas. and Henry Miller on First street opposite Devoy & Robson's hardware store. The companies arrived almost simultaneously, and the hooks were quickly on the roof, while water was obtained from the hydrant, followed by a stream from No. 1's nozzle. Three streams were soon playing, and the fire was out.

It originated in the simple, old-fashioned way, from sparks from the chimney which caught in the moss on the roof. The chimney had burned out but a half hour before, and particles of burning soot had evidently smoldered in the moss until it grew into a blaze.

The building, which was owned by Dr. Felix O'Toole, was damaged by the fire and water to the amount of about \$250, and was fully insured. The damage to the contents of the building was nominal, as everything was removed.

To the promptness of several citizens who were near when the fire started and did good service with buckets to due much credit in assisting to quickly suppress the blaze.

A Good Investment.

Some time since we mentioned that there was an opening for a paying investment in this city, in the matter of starting a tannery. We are now informed that parties thoroughly reliable, competent and well posted in the business, and who are well known in the city, are ready to enter into the business.

They will put in \$10,000 if the citizens will put in \$5000 to purchase a site and erect buildings, the \$5000 to be paid back in installments from the proceeds of the business, all to be paid within six years; or they will form a joint stock company with \$20,000 capital. This opportunity to start a paying business that will add to the welfare of the city, should not be overlooked. Such enterprises are just what Albany needs.

Opposed to Importing Catfish.

Recently some one wrote to Senator Mitchell asking for catfish to stock Tualatin lake. The request was referred to Mr. McDonald, of the United States fish commission who reported unfavorably on it. Hearing of this State Fish Commissioner E. P. Thompson addressed a letter to Senator Mitchell urging him to oppose the introduction into Oregon of any fish foreign to its waters until it can be determined whether the same fish would be detrimental to present fishing interests. He argued particularly against the catfish on the ground that it is a great spawner and, if the streams west of the Cascade mountains, which are the home of the salmon and trout, are stocked with them, irreparable injury would follow to the salmon and trout, compared with which the catfish is far inferior. Senator Mitchell replied that he would act in accordance with Commissioner Thompson's advice.—Oregonian.

They dashed up First street and turned up Ferry street, dragging the buggy bottoms side up. They were stopped near the college, the buggy being a wreck. No one was in the buggy and no one was hurt.
