E. E. Montague Nominated for Clerk, J. J. Whitney for County Judge and Jno. Smallman for Sheriff.

The Linn county democratic convention met at the court house in this city yesterday at 10 A. M. The convention was called to order by W. R. Bilyeu, chairman of the county central committee.

No time was wasted in speeches, and after the chairman had stated the object of the meeting, the convention proceeded at once to business.

On motion of J. L. Cowan, Geo. E. Chamberlain was elected temporary chairman. On motion of Sam May the temporary organization was completed by the election of O. P. Coshow secretary, and C. J. Shedd assistant.

A committee of three on credentials was appointed by the chair as follows: T. J. Black, J. B. R. Morelock and L. Senders.

A committee on permanent organization, consisting of J. L. Cowan, C. H. Ralston and Sam May, was likewise appointed.

On motion of Enoch Houtt a recess of 15 minutes was taken in order to give the committees time to report.

The report of the committee on organization, recommending that the temporary officers be made the permanent officers and arranging the order of business, was adopted.

J. Ribelin moved that the votes be cast by ballot, and an amendment that the ballot be by viva voce vote proposed by Enoch Houtt was carried by a vote of 43 to 38. The original vote then prevailed.

The convention then adjourned until 1 P. M.

T. J. Black moved that the motion whereby the viva voce system of voting was adopted be reconsidered, which prevailed. The original motion that the convention vote viva voce was then voted down.

The vote for representatives stood: Miller 67, Myers 60, Morelock 35, Swank 34, Hackleman 21, Hunsaker 12, Blevins 16, Hester 9, Blank 1, Myers and Miller having received a majority were declared two of the nominees of the convention.

THIRD BALLOT—BRYANT 34, WHITNEY 34, DORRIS 13.

The name of J. P. Galbraith was then placed in nomination by J. D. Arthur. J. L. Cowan inquired if the nominations had not been declared closed. The chairman ruled that nominations could be made at any time.

The fourth ballot stood Whitney, 31, Bryant 25, Galbraith 25, Dorris 1.

The name of Mr. Dorris was withdrawn.

Fifth ballot—Whitney 44, Bryant 18, Galbraith 17. On motion of H. Bryant the nomination of Mr. Whitney was made unanimous.

The ballot for commissioners resulted in the nomination of E. W. Cooper and G. W. Phillips.

For county clerk the name of N. P. Payne and E. E. Montague were placed in nomination. The first ballot stood Montague 43, Payne 41, Mr. Montague being declared the nominee of the convention.

For county recorder E. E. Davis was nominated with little opposition.

For sheriff the first ballot stood as follows: John Smallman 23, W. P. Smith 18, C. C. Jackson 14, Newton Crabtree 11, Levi Douglas 9, scattering 6.

The name of Levi Douglas was withdrawn, and a second ballot was taken as follows: Second ballot—Smallman 29, W. P. Smith 23, Jackson 16, Crabtree, 12, scattering 3.

Third ballot—Smallman 36, Smith 24, Jackson 14, Crabtree 11. The name of N. Crabtree was withdrawn.

Fourth ballot—Smallman 38, Smith 24, Jackson 23.

Fifth ballot—Smallman 40, Jackson 23, Smith 20.

Sixth ballot—Smallman 40, Jackson 24, Smith 18.

Seventh ballot—Smallman 42, Jackson 23, Smith 19.

The name of W. P. Smith was then withdrawn.

Eighth ballot—Smallman 43, Jackson 40, Smith 1. On motion of W. P. Smith Mr. Smallman was declared the unanimous choice of the convention.

For treasurer the first ballot stood: H. Farwell 36, W. E. Curl 18, A. R. South 9, A. L. Bridgefarmer 8, F. M. Daniels 7, J. M. Williams 4. H. Farwell was nominated on the second ballot.

For assessor Z. B. Moes was nominated on the second ballot, S. O. Wallace receiving 33 and J. L. Myers 9.

For school clerk L. M. Curl was nominated.

For surveyor no nomination was made, the democratic central committee being authorized to fill this vacancy or any other which might occur.

J. Shea was nominated by acclamation for coroner.

The following central committee was appointed: East Albany, Geo. E. Chamberlain; West Albany, J. L. Hill; Brownsville, W. T. Cochran; Brush Creek, J. N. Rice; Crawfordville, Wm. FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT.

It Will be Held in Portland Between June 16th and 20th.

The Portland News says: For some time past correspondence has been had between the Directors of the Northwestern Firemen's Association in regard to the time and place of holding the next tournament. It has been definitely settled that Portland will be the place, and the time will be between June 16th and 20th.

An effort will be made to have the tournament of 1889 eclipse all previous affairs of this kind in the Northwest. Teams will probably come as follows: Seattle will send two, Tacoma one, Vancouver one, Spokane Falls one, Walla Walla one, Astoria two, Salem two or three, Eugene one, Albany two, East Portland one, Oregon City one, and Portland will through the Volunteer Firemen's Association, endeavor to put two teams in the field.

The association will raise a large sum of money and hang up valuable prizes.

Yesterday's Nominations. The result of yesterday's nominations by the democratic convention was somewhat of a surprise, and prominent democrats do not attempt to conceal the fact that material was at hand for a much stronger ticket.

Some excellent men were placed in nomination, but the ticket is so weighted down by others who were nominated by the slaughter of good men that even staunch democrats were heard last evening to predict the defeat of a considerable portion of it.

The forks of the Santiam cannot complain this time of being left out in the cold, in fact they carried away a full share. The only Albany man nominated for the county office is J. J. Whitney for county judge, and it will be no task at all to find a republican who can interest him in the race next June.

The N. G. Accident. In the accident on the narrow gauge, three miles south of Oswego, Clackamas county, Wednesday afternoon, twelve passengers were injured and ten cattle were killed. The wreck took place while the train was going around a curve, and was caused by cattle rushing from the upper to the lower side of the car.

All the cars tumbled fifteen feet off the trestle, the engine remaining on the track. The only seriously injured person was Conductor Colburn. He was evidently pitched forward on his head and sustained a fracture of the skull. His injuries, while dangerous, are not necessarily fatal. It seems a miracle that no one was killed outright.

New Styles.
