He Demands His Rights and Will Sue the O. & C. Railroad for Heavy Damages.

Special to the Herald.] SALEM, March 26.—Information has been received here that Jim Westfall, the well known Chinese contractor of Albany, is about to begin a suit for heavy damages against the O. & C. railroad company for injuries received in being ejected from the ladies waiting room at the depot in Salem by one of the employees of the road. It is the rule at this depot that no Chinamen shall be allowed to remain in the ladies' waiting room. Jim was asked to go but refused, whereupon the employee led him out.

The Community's Loss.

In the death of W. B. Rice, which occurred Sunday morning, our city loses an honored, upright and influential citizen, and the Oregon Pacific railroad company an official whose place it will be hard to fill. For about 16 years Mr. Rice was passenger and freight agent and telegraph operator for the O. & C. railway at this place, and in that position became a universal favorite. No dissatisfaction ever grew out of his official action and no complaints were ever made, which is the highest meed or praise any man could receive. Always genial, pleasant and courteous, to know him was to like him, and no one will learn of his death who knew him but will feel a keen pang of regret that so early in life he has been called to pass over to the great majority on the other side of the dark river. A devoted wife and two little ones mourn with inconsolable grief, mingling their tears with the mother, sister and brother. Sunday evening a large concourse of citizens attended the brief funeral services at his late residence, conducted by Rev. E. R. Prichard and Rev. S. G. Irvine, and accompanied the remains to the depot to be conveyed on the south bound train to Ashland, where the funeral obsequies will take place. Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Barker and Mr. T. J. Stiles went to Ashland, the two gentlemen being a committee from the A. O. U. W., of which order Mr. Rice was a member.

Shot in the Finger.

A neat little item of the usual "didn't know it was loaded" order was furnished yesterday morning in Will Bros. gun store. A young man named Geo. Reeves, who lives across the river in Benton county, traded for a self-cocking pistol at the second hand store, and was given a cartridge as a sample. This he placed in the weapon, and soon afterwards stepped into Will Bros. gun store to compare it with a new one. He had ere this forgot that it was loaded, and of course when he began snapping the hammer to see how nice a self-cocking revolver can work, it was discharged. The young man got off very easily, and was in no wise repaid for his folly. Dr. Maston cut the ball out and dressed the mutilated finger. A self-cocking revolver was discharged in the same store earlier in the morning in the hands of Ed. Moore, the ball imbedding itself harmlessly in the wall. Revolvers which are "no loaded" are the most dangerous kind, and as long as young men monkey with them newspaper reporters will continue to write readable little paragraphs interspersed with an occasional obituary.

A Serious Accident.

From Mr. J. P. Galbraith, who returned yesterday from Brownsville, the particulars were obtained of a runaway accident which befell Mr. James Blakey, an old farmer of that place, nearly resulting in his death. On Saturday last while driving from a field with a harrow in his wagon his team ran away, throwing him out. He fell upon his neck and shoulders, and the fall was so severe that his neck was almost dislocated. He is about 70 years of age, and the injury was consequently quite severe, but at last accounts he was doing well.

A Mugwump.

Mr. L. M. Herren, of Turner, has a bird among his barnyard fowls which he calls a mugwump. He says it is a veritable cross between a Chinese, or Mongolian, pheasant and a chicken. The hen is fully developed and is now laying eggs. This bird was shipped by express from this city a few days since, having been raised near this city.

A New Kind of Hops.

Eureka, Texas, grows in the interior of Australia called by the colonists "native hops," which some day must come into prominent notice owing to its medicinal virtues, as well as the fact that its blossoms have all the qualities of common hops in an intensified degree. The habitat of this valuable plant is between the Darling and Lachlan rivers, and it spreads over an area of about 250,000 square miles. Each bush yields on an average about five pounds of hops, which hang in clusters all around the outside of the bush for about four months in the year, and are fit for plucking during all that period. The shepherds use them for fermenting bread; the brewers also use them in the fermentation of beer; and as a tonic bitters, they are unequalled by any known vegetable production. They thrive best upon a sandy soil; are very little care is required in their cultivation, as the bush is graceful and evergreen. The yield per acre is more than double that of common hops; no poles are required; and the picking is a comparatively easy and speedy proceeding. The climate and soil about Humboldt bay are admirable adapted for the new plant above mentioned, and it could be propagated here very easily and with great advantage.
