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AT WASHINGTON.
Possible Nominee for the Next President.

SENATORS AFTER CLAIM AGENTS.
Dependent Pension Matter—Investigation of Civil Service Rule—Ingalls Reply to Critics.

WASHINGTON, March 19.
Who will be nominated at Chicago? Less than three months from this time the convention will meet, hence all republicans are getting interested in the above question. It is a much easier question to ask than to answer. It is doubtful if the best informed republican in Washington would attempt to say who the candidate will be. He may be any one of the dozen gentlemen mentioned or he may be as yet unnamed. Let us consider how the chances stand at present.

Senator Sherman, is developing considerable strength in the South, but unless he can make some friends in other states his nomination is extremely doubtful. Senator Harrison and Judge Grushon have both shown themselves to possess much strength in the Northwest, but the ill feeling that has already cropped out between their followers disposes of the chances of both of them. Mr. Chas. Depew has a considerable following in the Eastern states and just now he is credited with having a real boom in Pennsylvania. So far no one of the other candidates appears to be attempting to antagonize Mr. Depew, but then his following is perhaps too small as yet to make that necessary. That's the situation as it exists to-day. The gentlemen mentioned are the only ones, whose friends have so far, attempted to boom them for the nomination. All the rest are a presently waiting for that concentration of sentiment that has as yet refused to take place in anyone's favor except Mr. Blaine's.

The pension claim agents of this city got a score in the Senate on Thursday. Senator Plumb had read a letter received by an ex-soldier in Kansas and written by a Washington pension agent, which intimated that the writer had special facilities for pushing private pension claims through Congress. The letter asked for a fee of \$25, \$10 in advance and balance upon passage of bill. Mr. Plumb said he believed "that large sums of money were being obtained from ex-soldiers by men who render them no service whatever."

Senator Hale wanted to know the name of the firm who sent the letter; in view of the fact the rules of the pension committee prohibited all attorneys or claim agents making any arguments before the committee, it was plain that they could render no service to the ex-soldier, therefore the letter was clearly intended to deceive and defraud the man to whom it was written. Mr. Plumb preferred not to name the firm until the whole matter had been thoroughly investigated by the pension committee. Senators Davis, Cockrell, Plumb, and Hale each took this occasion to denounce the Washington claim agents as "sharks."

The dependent pension bill has been under consideration by the House committee on pension, but as yet no action has been taken on it. Petitions have been presented in the House from Pennsylvania and Ohio, asking for the passage of a service pension bill and the per diem pension bill.

Senator Teller of Colorado, paid his respects to the President's message in a strong speech, on Thursday. He dwelt upon the immense advantage of a protective tariff and contrasted the great prosperity of this country with the poverty of free trade England.

Senator Hale's resolution for the appointment of a special Senate committee of seven, to investigate the many alleged violations, by federal officials, of the civil service law has been passed by the Senate and the committee appointed. The subject is a large one and includes officials from messengers to Cabinet officers but the result will pay for all the trouble. It will show the people of the country in spite of the great professions and promises of the administration, hypocrisy in its ground-work.

Senator Brown, of Georgia, is the latest democratic Senatorial Kicker at the administration tariff programme. He wants the internal revenue laws repealed at once, and it might be added, so do his moonshiner constituents.

The ways and means committee have commenced night or rather evening sessions, which it seems necessary in order to make such progress with the tariff bill, as will get it before the House in a reasonable time. It held its first evening meeting Saturday, when the internal revenue portion of the bill was disposed of. It was adopted without amendment. This does not foreshadow a peaceful time, however, many schisms are yet ahead.

Big Carolina Pines.
From the Raleigh News.
In a private letter to a gentleman in this city from Colonel John B. Whitford there is an account of some forest giants lately measured in Green and Wilson counties, on Contentnea Creek. One pine tree measured twenty two feet in circumference and would make a stick of timber, solid heart, six feet square and thirty five feet long, or straight-edge plank six feet-wide and thirty-five feet long. Another pine measured eighteen feet in circumference and 100 feet to the first branch. Some white oaks measured and would make planks two feet wide and sixty feet long. A pine which was felled for making shingles measured four and one-half feet in diameter and 142 feet in length. These immense trees are found abundantly in that section and will some day command a good price.

GENERAL NEWS.
Further Reports of Severe Snow Storm in the North.
FURNITURE USED FOR FUEL.
Our Usual Budget of News from East of the Rockies and from the Old World.

CHICAGO, March 27.—Dispatches from the Northwest continue to report severe storms of sleet and snow. In northern Wisconsin, Minnesota and Dakota over a foot and a half of snow has fallen, blocking the railroads badly. The little town of Revillo, Dakota, is completely blocked in, and is without fuel, the people being compelled to break up furniture for fires. In Iowa a sleet storm has prevailed for two days and the weather is very cold. It is feared that the wheat is seriously damaged.

The floods in the Missouri valley grow more threatening from day to day, as the gorges are becoming stronger with the cold weather. At Jackson, Neb., the people have abandoned their farms on the low lands and are seeking shelter on the hills.

Dr. McFlynn Re-Elected.
New York, March 27.—At a meeting of the anti-poverty society last night Dr. McFlynn was re-elected president for the ensuing year. The society endorsed the call for a national convention of the united labor party to be held at Cincinnati May 15. A letter was received from Henry George resigning the vice-presidency of the society, and James Redpath elected to fill his place.

Bank Officers Go Wrong.
RALEIGH (N. C.), March 27.—The directors of the State National Bank, having reason to believe that the president and cashier of the same have absconded with a large amount of assets, have closed the doors of the bank and turned over all of its affairs to the officers of the U. S. government.

Drowned in a Wash Boiler.
CINCO (Cal.), March 27.—A 2-year-old child of Wm. Mare was drowned in a wash boiler containing three inches of water this morning. The mother left the child for a few moments and placed her near the boiler, and when she returned she found her dead.

Prince Bismarck's Jubilee.
BERLIN, March 27.—Prince Bismarck yesterday celebrated the jubilee of his donning military uniform by a quiet dinner, at which Count Von Moltke, General Schlieffen, minister of war, General Albeim and others were present.

Disastrous Floods.
BERLIN, March 27.—The banks of the Elbe are flooded for a distance of many miles. Hundreds of villages are submerged and an enormous amount of damage has been done and many lives lost.

ROME, March 27.—It is reported that the queen of England will witness the review of the Italian and English man of war at Leghorn.
