FICTITIOUS NAMES.
The common practice of withholding the true signature, and adopting some fictitious cognomen for literary works, raises the question why such is the case.

Timsol gives the subject a full consideration, and thinks that various motives not wholly discreditable may lead an author to veil his personality. The most obvious of these is modesty, more or less strongly backed by pride. He may be anxious to rush into print rather than that the world may have the benefit of his ideas than that he should receive at once the credit of them. Then it is not certain before publication whether they will bring credit or the contrary—an unsuccessful novel, an unreadable dissertation, an array of flat and uninteresting, produces but a dubious reputation. When a writer has not already made his mark nobody can tell whether he is going to do it by any given book; at least this seems to be the verdict of experience. To be tested, the book has to be in type and on the shelves and tables, handled and read and talked about. For the unknown producer to label his effort with his full name and address seems to imply (in some cases) a conceded assumption of inevitable success; it is like standing on a barrel and crying, "See what a big boy I am and what fine things I can do." The public cares not a rap for the manufacturer, except as they may be interested in the products of his mill. If the budding he still-born, or display features and temper that attract only unfavorable attention, the parent might as well have contented the omnivorous which is, so far as his dream of his experiment prove successful, there will be plenty of time for inquiries as to who he is and responds thereto. Even after success in whatever degree is attained, there may be other incentives to concealment. Curiosity may be intrigued and easily extended so that was the case for some time with the "Waverly Novels," and less illustrious examples may be cited. There seems to be no sufficient reason why authors, noted or obscure, should not be allowed their will in this matter. Even authors of high celebrity have sometimes withdrawn into the anonymous when they wished to try a new departure, or simply throw their later work on its own merits, divested of the advantage of their names. No file beyond that of free choice can be laid down, but the part of wisdom would appear to be about this. Let a work pretending to be historical or scientific accuracy bear the writer's name, for he is responsible for its facts, and his authority or want of it must be recognized or fail to recommend his pages. But in pure (i.e., imaginative) literature the case is wholly different, and the book must approve or condemn the writer. If you are unknown to fame, publish with an assumed name. You thus escape the curses of catalogues and curious readers to whom you offer an application every whit as good as your private cognomen, while with that you decently withdraw into

the background; your book being the thing of importance, if any, and yourself a very secondary consideration.
