ABOUT EASTER.

Origin and Significance of Easter, the Christian Passover.

CEREMONIES ATTENDING THE DAY

The Observances of Eastertide Among Many Nations—Love Ceremony the Day.

Easter in Christendom, of course, commemorates the resurrection of Christ, though it takes its English name from the Teutonic goddess of spring, Eastre or Ostera, whose feast fell at the same season, the same being retained though the character of the celebration was changed. It is one of the movable feasts, moving backward and forward between March 22 and April 25, according as the full moon next after the vernal equinox falls nearer or further from the equinox.

Easter day, according to the ecclesiastical rule, is always the first Sunday after the full moon which happens upon or next after the 21st of March, and if the full moon happens upon a Sunday, Easter day is the Sunday after.

This decidedly complex rule was only arrived at after long striving and much contriving. At the very beginning a difference of opinion arose, some of the Christians keeping their festival on the same day that the Jews kept their Passover, the 14th of Nisan, while others, attaching more importance to the day of the resurrection, and also desiring to mark more conspicuously the difference between themselves and the Jews, kept their festival on the Sunday following the 14th of Nisan. Discussions at first pacific soon became heated, and threatened at the close of the second century a schism. This, however, was avoided by a compromise, the eastern and western churches agreeing to each maintain its own customs. The situation was further complicated by the fact that the ordinary Jewish year consisted of 354 days or twelve lunar months, a thirtieth of thirty days being intercalated every third year. Even then, however, the Passover often fell before the vernal equinox, and the western Christians, who considered the beginning of the natural year, objected to a mode of reckoning which might cause them to hold two paschal feasts in one year and none in the next. Constantine had the matter settled for the whole church at the council of Nice in 325, making Sunday the Easter day and laying down the rules which are still followed.

Many of the old customs of Eastertide still linger with us. The beautiful one of singing Easter hymns, remains a feature in the Tyrol. Bands of musicians for which the Tyrolese have always been noted, traverse every valley singing the beautiful Easter hymns to their guitars, calling out the people to their doors, who join them in their choruses, and together rejoice over this glad anniversary. Their wide brimmed Spanish hats are decorated with bouquets of flowers; crowds of children accompany them, and, when the darkness of night comes on, bear lighted torches of the pine wood, which throw grotesque shadows over the spectators and picturesque wooden huts.

With much of the lore and literature of Easter day our readers are acquainted, whether reference be had to the egg, the hare or the dancing of the sun. The Easter egg, however, it may be worth saying—whether it be a hen's egg boiled in a piece of colored print, or a costly envelope for bonbons—is supposed to represent the eggs used by the Jews at the feast of the Passover, or the colored egg given at the solar festival of the New Year by the old Persians. The egg, a natural symbol of life, appeared in the Athenian mysteries of Bacchus, in the Hindu tables, in the Japanese worship, in the religion rites of Egypt. The early Christians were wise as well as ingenious when they seized upon the immemorial superstitions and usages of the world around them and gave them a meaning and a part in the great work of the church.

Easter week at Rome is always a great season, being celebrated with elaborate ceremonies. The "Landing of Joy," as Easter day is designated, is ushered in by the firing of cannon and merry peal of bells. At St. Peter's the pope officiates at high mass and pronounces a benediction with indulgences and absolution. An unusual number of distinguished persons will witness the ceremonies this Easter, which will be of unusual significance, owing to the fact of its being the Jubilee year.

The advent of Easter in the commercial world means the ending of winter and the beginning of the spring season. Latterly we have our Easter openings in the various shops, just as we have our holiday openings, and no lady of fashion dreams of attending church Easter

morning without being arrayed in the so-called Easter bonnet and a new spring wrap and gown. Even in places remote from great business centers the feminine mind inclines to new apparel on Easter day. This is the part due, doubtless, to the old superstition that warns against appearing on Easter day in old apparel, lest there be a dearth of new things during the remainder of the year.

Not only is there a revival of trade in all things pertaining to personal apparel, but an impetus is felt in other directions. With the putting on of spring bonnet and gown women of housewifely propensities begin preparations for the annual house cleaning, which means new furnishing in various home departments. Hence the fresh array of new goods in the furniture shops, at the picture dealers and the shops given over to various household decorations.

GENERAL NEWS.

Harding and Pearl Page Sentenced to Penitentiary.

PEARL PAGE TO BE PARDONED

Railway Difficulties—Tie-Up in Chicago

The Herald's Special Dispatches. PORTLAND, March 31.—Judge Stearns today sentenced C. M. Harding to five years in the penitentiary, and Pearl Page to one year. A stay of execution was granted in the case of the woman while a petition asking Gov. Pennoyer to pardon her can be presented. The general opinion is that the Governor will grant the petition, which is very numerously signed by prominent and influential citizens of Portland.

THE RAILWAY STRIKE.

Difficulties Continue to Harass.

MILWAUKEE, March 31.—General Manager Miller, of the St. Paul road, said this morning that trouble with their men still continued at Chicago. The Chicago engine dispatchers have joined the ranks of the dissatisfied and before their places could be filled there was some delay to passenger trains at the Chicago terminus. These were caused by the failure on the part of the company to get engines out on time. About 300 of the employes of the company have quit work at Chicago. Manager Miller concludes by saying: "We are getting new engine dispatchers to supply the places of those who stopped work and all passenger trains except those of early morning are about on time. We are running as many freight trains as we can take care of in Chicago. St. Paul is in the market for freight both at Chicago and Milwaukee. On all other divisions of the road trains are running as usual. I do not believe there will be any further trouble."

MILWAUKEE & ST. PAUL TIE-UP

It Affects All Trains, Both Freight and Passenger.

CHICAGO, March 31.—Rumor says the tie-up on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul road which was decided upon at the meeting held last night, proves true. The engineers, firemen, switchmen, brakemen and a number of conductors at that road have quit work. The strike includes the employes of all the divisions centering in Chicago, both freight and passenger. The last passenger train manned by the brotherhood crew left the united depot at 11 o'clock last night. At a meeting held last night, which fully 700 St. Paul employes attended, a motion was made to tie-up the road and carried without a dissenting vote. The strike was not declared by any organization or brotherhood, at least not formally. The men say it was entirely individual action on their part.

HOPKINS SENTENCED.

He Gets Seven Years in the Penitentiary.

CINCINNATI, March 31.—Benjamin E. Hopkins, late assistant cashier of the Fidelity National Bank, who has been in jail two months awaiting sentence under conviction for violation of the national banking law, was brought to court this morning upon motion of District Attorney Burnett. He was sentenced to the penitentiary for seven years and two months. He appeared broken down from illness, but did not manifest deep emotion on receiving sentence. When the judge was saying that it would be better for him to be at Columbus during his illness than at the county jail, because he would not have to pay for the extra attention he might require, he interrupted, saying that that disadvantage had been removed by the jailer, who had been making extra charges.
