Linn County Republican Convention

A republican convention for Linn county is hereby called to meet at the court house in Albany on April 4th at 10 A. M. for the purpose of electing delegates to the state republican convention, which convenes in Portland April 11th, and for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for the various county offices, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. The convention will consist of 79 delegates, appointed as follows:

Table listing delegates from various locations: East Albany, West Albany, Halsey, Harrisburg, Brownsville, Shedd, Lebanon, Scio, Waterloo, Orleans, Crawfordsville, Sweet Home, Fox Valley, Center, Santiam, Franklin Butte, Syracuse, Liberty, Brush Creek, Rock Creek.

Total 79. The committee recommend that the primaries be held on March 31st, at 2 P. M. S. S. TRAIN, G. W. DAVIS, Sec. Chairman.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

HUNGARY is enduring flooded villages and starving people.

ZALINSKI'S new dynamite gun it is said will soon be perfected so that it will throw a 600 pound weight the distance of a mile. Stand from under when it explodes.

THE COVERS of old papers still continue to be the subject of news items. A correspondence between Napoleon I and King Louis of Holland is said to have just been made in an old lumber room in Paris.

MAJOR-GENERAL TERRY is to be placed on the retired list, and the query now is who will be his successor. Gen. Crook is the senior to whom the promotion naturally falls, but Gen. Mills is being urged for the place by his friends.

That phase of the Mills' bill, which places the flocks of the country at the mercy of free trade, but protects the manufacturer of woolen goods, receives no very flattering comment from all sections of the country. The owners of flocks see no reason in the matter of reducing their already lilliputian profits.

The crop prospects throughout Western Oregon are quite flattering. The fine weather in March enabled the farmers to make good the loss by the freeze out of the few varieties of winter wheat that suffered, by re-sowing the ground with spring wheat, and the fruit prospects are excellent thus far. If later frosts do not destroy the buds fruit will be very abundant this season.

ALICE BOLLINS in the Forum says: "No adjustment of the difficulty between capital and labor, or of the tenement problem, can either be relied on or admired, that depends upon any supercilious charity from the rich on the one hand, or on establishing their perfect equality with the poor on the other. It is not when we see another mother buying a handsome overcoat for her boy than we can afford that the envy and bitterness come; it is when we see our buyer a warmer one than we can afford that we begin to hate her. The poor are willing for you to be rich, and for themselves to work; but make it hard for them to get work—and may God have mercy upon your souls as well as

theirs." Probably this writer gives the gist of the matter as fully as can be given. Certain it is that if the laboring classes are given work and reasonable pay for it, they are as a rule contented. It is the selfish aggrandizement of the rightful share of the results of labor that stirs up the spirit of discontent and leads to that unrest that finally culminates in violent strikes, and other active efforts to right supposed wrongs.

WONDERFUL discoveries are constantly being made, but perhaps the most wonderful have grown out of the production of more perfect optical instruments. Disease germs present some of the most formidable microscopic difficulties known. It is not surprising that former glasses beclouded with aberration should fail to detect them. The enormous advances now made in their optical constructions warrant the prediction that another ten years will develop still greater powers of search, and lead to such decidedly advanced discoveries in the bacteria germs of various diseases that will revolutionize the medical treatment and lead to a much more successful battle in meeting the ills to which flesh is heir.

The fraternizing of European nations with our own, in any matter of mutual interest, is a matter of great advance towards that millennium time when war shall cease and universal brotherhood prevail throughout the nations of the earth. It is said that the first instance of the holding of a regular meeting of an English scientific society in this country will occur next fall, when the council of the iron and steel institute of England will meet here, probably in December. They come upon the invitation of American iron and steel manufacturers. Two hundred and fifty members, including some of the most prominent manufacturers and scientists of England, Germany, Westphalia, Sweden, Italy and Spain have promised to attend the meeting. Although this meeting smacks somewhat of the commercial effort to enhance the value of the output of iron and steel for the manufacturing syndicates, still it has enough of that universal peace hastening quality about it to make it entirely desirable and highly commendable.

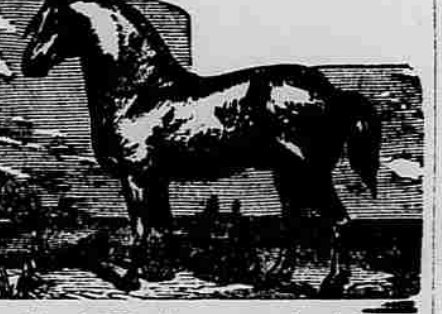
