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THE REPUBLICAN NOMINEES

The republican party of Linn county are to be congratulated on the nominations made yesterday. They are from first to last as good a set of men as has ever been placed before the voters of this county, and the particular qualifications of several at least of the candidates for the offices for which they were nominated, cannot but appeal to voters generally at the polls next June.

In the election of representatives this year there will be more than usual interest. In view of the fact that the next legislature will elect a United States senator, it is essential that men of no uncertain or wavering principles be elected, and the wisdom of the convention yesterday was sharply manifested in putting forward good, sober men who will make a strong race.

Of the county nominations the HERALD will have more to say hereafter—something that will not doubt in several respects be of interest to the voters of Linn county. It is sufficient now to say that the county affords no better men than those put forward by the republicans.

THE GERMAN SITUATION.

The attention of the civilized world is directed at present to the condition of affairs in the German capital, where so lately the revered emperor dropped the mantle of earthly duty and passed from sight forever; and where, at present, the new emperor, whose physical strength is said to be not adequate to the work his strong will is taking hold of, stands forth the most prominent object.

The Philadelphia Press at the time of the funeral of Kaiser William said that the voiceless German emperor is the most pathetic figure in the history of the century. None more so than this man standing silent and erect in a military uniform, which he will never have the strength to dignify by active command, while his father's funeral passed below his window. Whether he will be more than a pathetic figure is not yet clear. His words are for peace. His state invites war. If Russia is ever to fight Germany, her best time has come, when the head of the German state is a slowly dying man. Germany is not ruled by ministers. Its government is by, through and with the emperor. Frederick III puts this personal power as night and grasps it as firmly as any of his predecessors. His father's two great ministers are too weak to attend their master's funeral. The German army is a splendid machine, whose strength is not abated by these changes. The tri-state league still stands the mightiest military force Europe ever saw of one will. But for all this the great fact that Germany is weaker with an emperor feeble than with an emperor strong, and the weakness of Germany, real or imagined, must surely tempt Russia. The personal policy of the new emperor at home was only guessed at until his letter to Prince Bismarck appeared. Men vaguely looked for the parliamentary institutions from his liberal views. These are not pledged. They might have been ten or twenty years ago. The hope men once had in rule by parliamentary votes is not as strong as it was. The French trial has dealt it a blow. So has the drift of England. The plain turn of the day is toward rule by one man, at in power and kept there by the voice of the nation more or less clear, acting once for all in choosing a dynasty or at briefer intervals backing a Bismarck in his policy of blood and iron. This view Frederick III takes. His father used it to make Germany an armed camp. He proposes to use it to create a civilized nation, great in letters, in art, and in material comfort. He sees clearly, to use an apt quotation recently employed elsewhere.

How wide the limits of the But seen a splendid and happy. Europe gains by this as much as Germany. It relieves the military

tension of a generation. Among other things it enables President Carnot to act as if the production and promotion of soldiers and soldiers were not the first duty of a modern state. But this aim, the noblest set by any ruler since the good emperors gave the Roman world a century of peace, is personal. The old machine of personal power is left unchanged, ready to be seized on the emperor's death by a young man who believes in war as the one fit trade of men who rule. We have, therefore, if Frederick dies, a change in this policy certain, and if he lives a chance that a weak rule will tempt Russia to war. In neither case does spring open in hope for Europe.

The observations of the press are undoubtedly the conclusion of every intelligent observer, but Frederick III is developing a power both physical and mental, and a controlling influence that materially changes the aspect of affairs as far as he is concerned. He gives promise of not only reversing the judgment that pronounces his administration weak, but may also gather the leading strings from the hands of Bismarck—who apparently has an inclination in the warlike direction—and by his pacific control give Germany and Europe a lasting peace. All lovers of progress and humanity will fervently wish that he may.
