FATALLY ILL.

Roscoe Conkling's Condition

Changed Much for the Worse.

A CONSULTATION OF PHYSICIANS.

They Say That He is Afflicted with Brain Trouble, and He is Not Likely to Recover.

New York, April 9.—Roscoe Conkling's condition changed much for the worse last night. He was swooped up in the evening by the presence of his wife, whom he had not been permitted to see since his illness became serious. After her departure he sank into a stupor, from which he could not be aroused only at long intervals, and then only to display symptoms of delirium.

Dr. Agnew, an eminent oculist, called at Conkling's residence last night. At the time of his leaving the patient seemed to be not much worse, though his temperature had risen perceptibly. Dr. Maurice Barker said he feared Conkling's ocular trouble had caused affection of the brain, which may prove fatal. "All I care to say just now," said Dr. Barker, "is that Mr. Conkling has had a bad change within the last twenty-four hours, and is very poorly indeed. I have called in Dr. Sands and Dr. De la Field, and they, in company with Dr. Agnew and myself, visited the patient this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.

This evening Conkling's condition is unchanged. Drs. Sands, De la Field, Barker and Agnew called at Conkling's house and had a consultation. Dr. Barker, at the conclusion of the conference, said that the patient's condition was very unpromising. That he was suffering from inflammation of the ear, which had extended to the membranes of the brain, and probably: were that he could not recover, though there was a possibility that he might get well.

GENERAL NEWS.

Nomination of Indian Agent at the Warm Spring Agency.

STATE NORMAL SCHOOL BURNED.

Property Valuing \$180,000 Destroyed—Eight Hundred Students Escape—The Dead Lock in Congress.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—The president sent to the senate this afternoon the nomination of Daniel W. Butler, of Wasco, Oregon, to be Indian agent at the Warm Springs agency.

NORMAL SCHOOL BURNED.

A Loss of \$180,000, but the 800 Students all Escape.

TERRE SANTE, Ind., April 9.—The state normal school burned this morning all except the walls. Eight hundred pupils were in the building when the fire broke out, all of whom escaped without a scratch. They lost, however, most of their books and wraps. In pursuance with the policy of the state there was no insurance on the structure. Its cost was \$189,000, of which the city of Terre Santa gave \$80,000, in addition to the grounds. It was from the steps of this edifice that President Cleveland spoke when he was here last fall. Temporary quarters have been secured, and nearly the students will remain in the school.

Old World Affairs.

BERLIN, April 9.—It is stated today that Prince Bismarck has abandoned his position to the marriage of Prince Alexander of Battenburg, and Princess Victoria, having gained certain other concessions, and that all the difference between the emperor and Prince Bismarck are now settled.

The Empress Victoria and Princess Victoria, Sophia and Margaret, have started for Posen to inquire into the condition of the sufferers by the floods.

The Day in Congress.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—The sixth day of filibustering on the direct tax bill began in the house of representatives this morning. Motions and rolls commenced as soon as the session opened and continued all day.

A Foolish Boaster.

DUBLIN, April 9.—The Freeman's Journal says that Balfour's foolish boast that the national league has been killed, when pricked exploded like a bladder. A meeting was held yesterday and established conclusively that the league is alive and kicking.

FROM AN OREGONIAN.

How They Catch the Material for seal skin sacsques.

Lieut. Frederick Schwatka, an old Oregonian of Arctic exploration fame, contributes to Woman for March the following interesting description of seal clubbing: "The driving of the fur seal inland is not uninteresting. A number of Aleuts having gotten between the ani and on the shore—most of them probably asleep—and the water's edge, the latter, awakening and finding their retreat to the surf cut off, scramble further up on the land. The Aleuts, probably a dozen in number, form a sort of funnel-shaped skirmish line and approaching the animals, that keep retreating before them. To prevent their being overheated by exertion, which might affect the skin if not immediately stripped from the slain animal, they are seldom driven much faster than half a mile an hour, and often allowed to rest. As far as possible the selection is made from male animals about three or four years old, when the fur is the prime; but as the maximum of strength and belligerency is not reached for a few years after this it is easy to see why the best animals for fur have not the best places on the rocks, but are found skulking off by themselves, so numerous are they and so easy to drive to the killing grounds that the Aleuts have no trouble in securing the wioie 100,000 in a week or ten days over a month's time. There is an object in hurrying the work, as the skins are better earlier in the season, but if their be much warm weather during this time the driving is slower and all the other work is correspondingly retarded.

The seals having cooled off for two or three hours they are killed in herds of about one hundred and fifty strong by striking them on the head with peculiarly shaped clubs made particularly for this purpose. If the day is warm they skin the animals rapidly, killing but a few at a time, but if cold they can kill even a thousand or so before beginning work in taking the skins. It takes about five minutes to skin a seal, a work that is very severe, although in cases it has been done by very active men in a minute and a half.
