The Oldest Living Sovereign.

Cincinnati Enquirer.

By the death of the Emperor of Germany the Queen became the oldest European reigning sovereign. There is only one ruler who has kept his jubilee. It is the Emperor of Brazil, who became sovereign when he was a baby of six years, but he is six years younger than Queen Victoria. Two European sovereigns are older in years than Queen Victoria, King Christian of Denmark, who will soon be seventy, but who has reigned for only twenty-five years, and the King of Holland, who is seventy-one years old, but who has reigned for only forty-nine years. The Queen has reigned eleven years longer than the Emperor of Austria, twenty-six years longer than the King of Denmark, twelve years longer than the King of the Netherlands and twenty-eight years longer than the King of Belgium.

GENERAL NEWS.

Conkling's Condition Pronounced

a Little More Favorable.

PRESIDENTIAL APPOINTMENTS.

The Derb Lock in Congress Remains Un-

changed—The Wheels of Legislation

Clipped by the Struggle.

NEW YORK, April 10.—At 9:30 this morning Dr. L. Barker said that Conkling's condition was much improved, and the operation that had been performed seemed to accomplish all that was expected. His temperature had fallen to 99 and his pulse to 90. He slept three hours during the night. Everything was quiet at the residence from a late hour last night till this morning at 7 o'clock, when Mrs. Conkling was seen. She said that the ex-senator passed a comfortable night and was then somewhat better. He was resting quietly and had experienced no further attacks of delirium, and seemed to be improving.

Appointments by the President.

WASHINGTON, April 10.—The president to-day sent to the senate the following nominations: Henry B. Lavering, of Massachusetts, to be United States marshal for the district of Massachusetts. Indian agents: John Blair, of Kansas, to the Pottawattamie and Great Nemaha agencies; Caleb M. Johnson, of Kentucky, Pima agency in Arizona; Elmer A. Howard, of Iowa, Kiowa, Comanche and Wichita agency in Indian territory; Thos. P. Smith, of Arizona, Osage agency in Indian territory. Lieutenant-Colonel Cyrus B. Constock to be colonel-major; J. A. Smith to be lieutenant-colonel.

THE DEAD LOCK.

The Present Condition of Affairs

Will Continue Until Tuesday.

WASHINGTON, April 10.—All talk of compromising the dead lock in the house of representatives has ceased. The belief was expressed this afternoon that the present condition of affairs will continue until Tuesday next, the day when it is intended to call up the tariff bill, when a determined effort will be made to break the dead lock. There is a desire on the part of the democratic advocates of the direct tariff bill to have a caucus called for the purpose of determining what course shall be pursued to put an end to the present stagnation of business, but while its opponents indicate a willingness to have a caucus called for consultation, they decline to be bound by a caucus.

IN RUSSIAN SCHOOLS.

Pleasures Denied the Pupils in the

Institutions at Kiev.

1. It is prohibited to the pupils to visit institutions of pleasure, as Chateau de Fleur, Tivoli, Mineral Waters, or pleasures in Bokovaya Roscha (grove), or on the other side of the Dnieper, or in any other pleasure gardens. It is allowed to visit the Botanical Garden. 2. It is allowed to visit the theater only when permission is granted by the authorities, and by no means in the gallery. 3. It is prohibited to visit public balls, masquerades, clubs, dancing evenings, tea gardens, cafe houses, confectioneries, billiard halls, and other like public institutions. It is strictly prohibited to visit secret societies or circles. 4. It is prohibited to go boating on the Dnieper and on pleasure trips out of the city, unless together with the parents or guardian. 5. It is prohibited to walk in the streets or be out of doors later than 9 P. M. unless there be some extra event or together with the parent or guardian. 6. Every pupil is compelled to have his ticket with him and to present it at the first demand of the police or persons employed by the Government known for that duty by their appearance. In case the pupil refuses to fulfill this demand, or if there be plain disobedience, the person to whom this matter is intrusted has the right to apply for assistance to the police in order to bring the offender to the school where he belongs. 7. The pupils when not at home, must fulfill punctually the ordered form of dress, not excluding the knapsack for books with all the school supplies, and all his butions must be stricted. To wear civil dress is strictly prohibited. 8. On meeting with officials, and also with teachers or assistants, the pupil's must greet them with a polite bow, taking off the cap or hat. 9. It is prohibited to take out books for reading from public libraries. There is a library in every school purposely for the scholars, from which the pupils only may draw books for reading. Should it happen that the pupil should take out a prohibited book, he must present it to the officials. 10. None of the pupils has the right to be engaged in tutoring without the special permission of the official.
