BRITISH FREE TRADE.

The Herald is indebted to the Dry Goods Chronicle for an advance copy of an article written for that journal by Mr. H. K. Thurber, of New York. Mr. Thurber takes up a contributor to the Star, who signs himself "Naumbek" and who argues that the farmers' profits and wages are determined by the needs of the roasts of India, whose clothes consist of a breech cloth, of the half enslaved peasants of Russia, and of the Italians who are growing wheat in South America, and thinks the farmer should favor free trade.

Mr. Thurber replies as follows: "Well, granting all that he so graphically described to be so, then it makes it all the more necessary that we should build up a home market for our farm products. We should protect our manufacturing interests so that instead of a population of 62,000,000 to 65,000,000 of people to feed on this continent, we should have 100,000,000, and instead of importing as we did in 1836 manufactures of—

Wool to the amount of \$41,421,319 Iron to the amount of 27,957,939 Cotton to the amount of 29,347,735 Cotton to the amount of 29,983,155 Wool to the amount of 8,617,816 Leather to the amount of 11,830,708 we should manufacture in this country nearly all these goods and wares. If we should do this it would distribute in the wages paid to our own operatives at least \$75,000,000, a portion of which at least is now paid to operatives in Europe. Assuming that \$75,000,000 is the amount that would be paid for the labor on the manufactured goods if manufactured in this country that we import to the amount of \$175,000,000, it would give \$1,000 a year to 75,000 families. Averaging each family at eight persons, this would be an increase of \$90,000 to our population and what for all that make a home market.

They consume of farm products. The same attention to building up our commercial marine that England gives to her marine would add another million of consumers to our population and would give us a chance that we do not now have in the South American markets, so that many millions more might be profitably employed in our manufacturing industries.

"The preamble to the first tariff passed in 1789 declared it was necessary for the support of the government, for the discharge of the debts of the United States, and the encouragement and protection of manufactures, that duties be laid on goods, wares and merchandise imported; but it did not add what is so self-evident to all thinking persons that should now be added, for the protection of our laboring population, so that they may receive wages that will equalize the different conditions of life of the laboring classes in this country and the crowded populations of Europe." It might have gone further and added that 'the tillers of the soil shall have a home market for their products in their own country.' If the 'American market is the best one in the world,' as foreign manufacturers say, we want it for Americans.

"If the laboring classes in Europe want to manufacture for us let them come and make their homes in this country and help build up our manufacturing centers, live in our houses, or build houses for themselves, consume our farm products on this continent rather than have them transported across the ocean in foreign ships at the expense of our farmers to be consumed there. This doctrine may be called 'selfish and narrow minded,' and on the principle that 'all men are brothers' we should be willing to let Europe do all our manufacturing, as well as all of our carrying trade on the ocean. But if we follow that principle long enough we will come to the same condition that Ireland is now in. She surrendered up her home manufacturing interests, and the result is apparent to the world."

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

Our dispatches this morning from Portland indicate that the republicans assembled in the state convention have acted harmoniously and wisely in nominating the state ticket. Hermann is the choice of the people of Oregon for congressman and he will be re-elected by a rousing majority. Judge Lord has made an able justice on the supreme bench and it is certain election to put him again on the ticket. Albany is not left out this time, and the voters of Linn county will unite in showing their preference for H. H. Hewitt for district attorney at the polls next June.

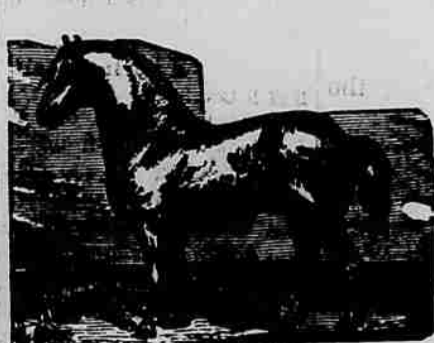
