POLITICAL PRATTLE.
What Senator Stanford Thinks of the Presidential Outlook.
NEW YORK, April 13.—Senator Stanford to-day said: "I have heard said here that Depew was simply a stalking horse for Blaine, and that the New York delegates will go to Chicago ostensibly for Depew, but in reality for Blaine. I don't believe Depew will consent to play a role for any man."
"Could Depew carry California?"
"I believe any Republican who has no special antagonism can carry the coast. I like Depew, but he is a man who could increase in strength after the nomination. Some men who are very strong before the convention, do not expand or gain strength as the campaign progresses. Senator Sherman, I think, could carry California. Two years ago he could not, but he has gained much by his course since."

RUSSIAN PETROLEUM FOR INDIA.
The export of Russian petroleum to India is rapidly assuming the dimensions of a considerable industry. From data which have just reached here from Batoum it appears that during the last fifteen years steamers were chartered from that port to India with petroleum, the total of which amounted to \$98,843 casks. One steamer was freighted direct to Hongkong with 75,000 casks. The greater part of the shipments to India, about 500,000 casks, were sent direct to Bombay. The remainder to Calcutta and Madras. The last year's export has given an impetus to the trade that during the last month of the current year shipments amounting to 250,000 casks were carried in four large steam vessels to Bombay.

LOSING HER TRADE.
Marked Decline in the Lumber Business in Chicago.

"Chicago is slowly but surely losing its place as the largest lumber market in the world." Thus spoke the secretary of the Lumbermen's Exchange, T. F. Swan. In support of his statement he furnished the names of several lumber firms that have recently either gone out of the lumber business entirely, removed to other places, or which will do so in the near future. In the whole of the British Isles only 900,000,000 feet of lumber changed hands last year. Chicago alone sold over 2,000,000,000 feet, or more than twice as much. The capital invested in it in this city amounts to hundreds of millions of dollars, and many thousands of the population find lucrative employment in handling the lumber. When it is considered that the were, on January 1st last, only eighty-three lumber dealers in Chicago, and out of this number a dozen are leaving this city or the business this spring, it will be apparent that grave dangers must be threatening the lumber interests of Chicago.

BERNARD CONGRATULATED.
Indications that Oregon's Mill Service will be Greatly Improved.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—Representative Hermann, of Oregon, was congratulated to-day by many members on the republican side on his unanimous re-nomination for congress by the state convention in Oregon. Mr. Hermann will be the first representative elected to the fifty-first congress, if the republicans carry Oregon. The democrats are making strenuous efforts to win that state from the republican party in the next election. Cleveland and Don Dickinson are employing every device in their power to make Oregon democratic in the June election.

A BRAVE LAD.
A Boy Kills a Tramp while Defending his Mother.

SEATTLE, April 12.—Yesterday morning a tramp appropriated the house of H. M. Giddings, which is situated near Alki point, a promontory opposite Seattle, and engaged in conversation with Mrs. Giddings, and her daughter aged 14, and son Paul, aged 17. The man acted strangely but finally went away. He returned yesterday with a Winchester rifle. The mother and her children were frightened and locked the back door, towards which the tramp was approaching, and endeavored to escape by the front door. The man met them and made an attack on them. He struck at the little girl but missed her. He then aimed a murderous blow at Mrs. G. with the rifle, but again missed and the weapon, striking the ground, was broken.

He renewed the attack, when the mother called upon her boy Paul to bring a rifle from the house and shoot the man. The little fellow did this and as the ruffian was about to resume the attack on Mrs. G. the boy fired, sending a ball through the man's leg at the knee. The fellow ran down to the beach. Later Mrs. G. and children followed him and soon after they reached him he died from loss of blood.

The identity of the man is not certain, but it is believed he is the person whose sanity was questioned before the probate court some time ago. He probably stole the rifle from Myers' cannery, which was burned the same morning, and it is believed he was the person who set fire to it.
