POLYGAMY MUST GO.

The Twelve Apostles of the Mormon church in Utah have issued their annual letter of advice to their people. It is an exhortation to clean and right living, and contains not a word in support of polygamy. A young elder in the conference raised his adolescent voice in behalf of plural marriage, and was sat upon by his elder brethren, to his great confusion. Signs multiply that the church intends to put itself in line with the customs of civilization and the laws of the country upon this subject, and we are persuaded that if congress will propose and the states adopt an amendment to the constitution forbidding polygamy in any state or territory, and giving the federal entire jurisdiction of the question, the whole system will soon disappear. Such amendments should protect the families which are the fruits of polygamy, and should not visit upon women the reproach of unchastity, nor upon children the stain of illegitimacy. Nor should it relieve selfish men of the support of those for whom they are morally or immorally responsible. Polygamy must go, but the policy of the government should be to make easy the abandonment of a practice at which the civilized world frowns in all countries.

The British extradition treaty is still before the senate, and is likely to remain there for an indefinite period. It may not be generally known that the senate committee on foreign relations, in reporting the proposed treaty to the senate, recommended some important amendments. The measure before the senate, therefore, now differs in several particulars from the imperfect pre-terred draft of the treaty which was published last spring, and upon which the comments in both countries have been based. The amendments are these: That persons shall be extraditable, first, for larceny and embezzlement of amounts more than fifty dollars, or ten pounds sterling; and second, for assaults upon life with explosives. These two provisions are probably the most important in the treaty. The first is the one upon which the Canadian government and the United States are understood to be in accord. It is designed to prevent Canada from being made a refuge for bank thieves and embezzlers; and to relieve it from continuing to be a Botany bay for the states. The benefits would be of course reciprocal, and the United States could no longer be the asylum for the Canadian embezzlers, the tide of which seems now to be setting in this direction.

A new use has been discovered for the electric light. The body of a boy drowned at Winchendon, Mass., recently, was found through the use of the electric light, a bulb being fastened to a pole and submerged, illuminating the water for a considerable distance in the neighborhood. The electric light promises to become an important aid in all manner of submarine operations.

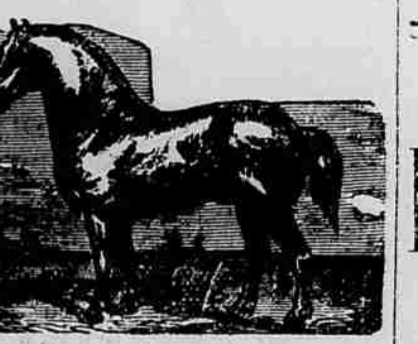

D. 1888, at one o'clock, p. m., receive sealed bids for a contract to build fifty rods of rock and dirt road, commencing on the east end where the plank run commences on Beaver Slough near widow Ray's and run west over the ground where the old Beaver Creek bridge now stands a distance of fifty rods, by taking the flooring, off the old bridge and laying it on the ground cross ways as far as it goes. Then use tie poles the rest of the way until the whole fifty rods of ground in length is covered. Then cover this with rock at least twelve inches thick and ten feet wide.
