IS IT JUST WHAT IT SHOULD BE?

The governor of Louisiana, who failed to get the sought for re-nomination for the office, in his disappointment vowed that the state should have a fair election. This at the time was taken to mean that no one should be prescribed on account of political affiliation, and that every voter should have undisturbed access to the polls.

So unfair and violent were the words of the governor that his own democratic papers condemn him. The Times, a democratic paper of Tullulah, says: "The speech throughout was a plain and unvarnished plea for the strictest drawing of the color line, and a call on the white men of the state to unite to defeat, by fair means or foul, the aspirations of the republican party through its most conspicuous and ablest lieutenant—Wormth. Coming from a private citizen such utterances mean nothing but the vaporings of a narrow-minded individual, but coming from the governor of the state of Louisiana means far more. It means that the boasted political freedom of the state is a fraud; that political freedom means only to vote the democratic ticket and nothing else; it means that the Northern men who are invited and urged to bring their families among us and settle are deceived."

Y., who while plying her vocation as a newspaper reporter, procured from Mr. Phelps, who bears the reputation of being the most successful lobbyist in the country, a list of Albany legislators who could be purchased to support a bill she represented as desiring to have passed, together with the amounts requisite to secure the aid of each individual, and then dished up the entire list as a sensational article to the world, succeeded in causing a sensation and placing lobbyist Phelps in an extremely tropical water.

A GOOD MAN.

H. H. Hewitt, republican candidate for prosecuting attorney of the third judicial district, is well qualified for the duties of the office to which he aspires, and he is a solid republican and a square and upright man. He is well spoken of among his neighbors, who know him best, and will no doubt carry Linn county, which has a democratic majority. D. 1888, at one o'clock, p. m., receive sealed bids for a contract to build fifty rods of rock and dirt road, commencing on the east end where the planking commences on Beaver bridge near widow Ray's and run west over the ground where the old Beaver Creek bridge now stands a distance of fifty rods, by taking the flooring, etc. the old bridge and lay it on the ground cross ways as far as it goes. Then use fir poles the rest of the way until the whole fifty rods of ground in length is covered. Then cover this with rock at least twelve inches thick and ten feet wide. Then put dirt and gravel about three inches thick on the rock. There shall be two cutovers in said rock road. The first one about ten rods from the starting point on east end of the old bridge. The second cutover to be about twenty three rods from east end of said rock road. Each of said cutovers to be made sufficient width for all teams to pass.
