LARGE AND SMALL FARMS.

A Chat with Dr. Maston About His Big Purchase—Small Tracts for Newcomers.

Dr. G. W. Maston, who has purchased the 400 acre farm of Mrs. L. A. McConnell, near this city, was asked yesterday by a Herald reporter what object he had in purchasing that valuable place.

The doctor, who was enveloped in a long linen ulster and had a driving whip in his hand, said, "I am just now going out to go over the land, and it is my intention to divide it up in small tracts and place it upon the market to meet the steadily increasing demand for small places."

"Many newcomers who arrive from the East," he continued, "want to purchase land, but in two many instances the farms in Linn county which are for sale consist of several hundred acres, and it requires a small fortune to purchase one of them, and the result is that men with moderate means who want to stop here and purchase a small quantity of good land near the city cannot do so. I propose to divide the land into small tracts to suit purchasers who will build neat residences upon the same."

"That there is a large demand for such places," he said, "is shown from the fact that since I bought it on Monday, I have had several offers from those wanting small tracts."

If many other of the large farms about Albany were treated as Dr. Maston proposes to treat his—divided up and sold to newcomers who want a small piece of land to build a neat home upon, it would be of advantage to the country. It is such things that help to make the city and country boom.

EIGHT THOUSAND TEACHERS.

A. D. As there are 275,000 teachers in the United States, there will be quite a gathering. It is anticipated that at least 10,000 will attend from the Eastern States.

The governor decided to appoint a swamp land agent to act in conjunction with Col. Elliott. It will be remembered that the work was well under way last year and when the weather became inclement in the Fall it was abandoned. It is a well known fact that much of the land that has been taken up as swamp and overflowed land was never wet save by the rains and Jews of heaven. The commissioners were examining this disputed land and reporting on its character. It is thought the commissioners will begin work in the vicinity of Lakeview, Lake county.

THE EMERALD LAND.

How a California Journalist Discants on the Charms and Advantages of Oregon.

It is greatly to the interest of Californians to have a large population in Oregon and Nevada. Oregon must supply us soon with important and necessary commercial productions which we will cease to create for ourselves. The two states will be a mutual prosperity. Oregon has a climate soft and salubrious by contrast with that of the East, and soil that is unrivaled for standard crops. There is plenty of arable land, majestic timber, mineral resources not half developed, and above all the opportunity to buy at moderate figures. These allurements are not lost upon the rest of the country, and backed by a hearty welcome to the new comer, they will speedily second what nature has done for the founding of a great American commonwealth.

Joseph Miller's characterization of Oregon as the "Emerald Land" has been seized upon by the Eastern press, for it implies a land where grass grows and water runs, and is associated with verdure and foliage, with sun and shade.

All tastes are not the same, and it is a happy promise of the symmetrical development of these coast states that their good qualities so complement each other as to be attractive to a great diversity of tastes. In climate they run from dry to humid, and in productions they cover the great area between the two extremes.

The man who traversed the long Oregon trail forty years ago were the pioneers of a great civilization. They were to the Argonauts who made early California what the adventurous settlers in the Wyoming valley and along the blue Juniata were to the commercial Knickerbockers who settled New York. We speak of the Middle States now as a group allied in interest and progress working out the same destiny and greatly interdependent. The Pacific States are to be another family group like that, with a population which will balance the census of the two sides of the continent.
