DEATH OF ROSCOE CONKLING

The death of Roscoe Conkling at New York on the 18th inst., was not unexpected, and marks the departure of another of the many illustrious men of the nation who have passed away within a twelve-month.

Roscoe Conkling was born at Albany, New York, October 30, 1829, and was the son of a distinguished lawyer, Alfred Conkling for many years United States district judge. Young Conkling received a high school education, but was not a college graduate. He removed to Utica in 1846, rose rapidly in his profession of the law, was elected mayor of Utica in 1853, was elected to the thirty-sixth congress from the twentieth New York district in November, 1858, and with the exception of one term, when he was beaten by Francis Kernan for re-election, represented his district in the lower house until March 4, 1867, when he took his seat in the United States senate, succeeding Ira Harris. He was re-elected in 1873 and in 1879, and resigned in consequence of his quarrel with President Garfield in 1881. The New York legislature, to whom he presented himself for vindication by asking re-election to the senate, declined to grant it and he was defeated. He at once went to New York city and applied himself to the practice of his profession and rapidly rose to the very front rank. His income has been estimated to have reached nearly \$100,000 a year, and he dies in his prime, leaving behind him a great name.

The free-traders who are urging the abandonment of protection on the ground that unrestricted competition will give us cheaper prices for everything should bear in mind that the countries where things are cheapest are invariably those in which the condition of the people is the most miserable. Thus in China, where a coin worth a tenth of a cent circulates, there is perhaps more misery than in any other place on the globe. In Belgium things are much cheaper than in England, and people are correspondingly miserable. In England prices are lower than in the United States, but who is so foolish as to claim that the scale of comfort is not infinitely higher in this country than in Britain. It may be set down as an axiomatic truth that cheapness always results disastrously to the masses. The explanation of the fact is furnished by the political economists, who tell us that the tendency is to press the workman as close as possible to the limit of subsistence. In a cheap country the limit is so extremely low that no workman can save by practicing self-denial. He must either spend all he earns or starve. In a country like the United States, where the price of everything embraces the idea of a liberal return to the producer, there is always a chance for the thrifty workman to set aside a portion of his earnings.

The Alta, California, the leading democratic newspaper of the Pacific coast, says: "Rampant: partisanship sometimes sneers at the independent vote, but the man who casts it has the compensating pleasure of expressing his conscience at the ballot-box, where the conscience of the rank partizan is usually suppressed."

The celebrated "driven well" cases may now be considered settled. The supreme court has refused the rehearing that was asked for, and the public can now read all the driven wells they want.

The senate has passed a bill giving Dr. Mary Walker a pension of \$25 a month as "late assistant surgeon, United States army." It passed another giving a pension of \$600 a year to the widow of General Stone. It also voted pensions to the widows of Rear Admiral Nicholson, Gen. Kilpatrick, Gen. Anderson, Gen. Taylor, Commander Gibson, Medical Inspector Denby of the navy, and to increase the pension of Nancy Raines, ninety-six years of age, the oldest revolutionary pension on the rolls.

D. 1888, at one o'clock, p. m., receive sealed bids for a contract to build fifty rods of rock and dirt road, commencing on the east end where the plankling commences on Beaver bridge near widow Bay's and run west over the ground where the old Beaver Creek bridge now stands a distance of fifty rods, by taking the footing, off the old bridge and laying it on the ground cross ways as far as it goes. Then use fir poles the rest of the way until the whole fifty rods of ground in length is covered. Then cover this with rock at least twelve inches thick and ten feet wide. Then put dirt and gravel about three inches thick on the rock. There shall be two culverts in said rock road. The first one about ten rods from the starting point on east end of the old bridge. The second one about twenty three rods from east end of said rock road. Each of said culverts to be made sufficient width for four teams to pass.
