LABOR'S RECOMPENSE.

The incentives to toil, which cause human beings to delve in the avocation of every day life, are various. Of course it is reasonable and just that every individual should receive recompense for the exertions that he puts forth that he should be paid for the value that he creates by his individual exertions. But that recompense can come in many other ways than by the actual reception of the coin that passes as the commercial medium of exchange.

For instance to very many the perfection of the results of their labor is the only recompense they receive and is received as fully satisfactory. The mother that devotes her life to laboriously building up a happy and harmonious home circle and family is fully recompensed in the successful accomplishment of that object, for the many weary, toiling years that have led to its attainment. The artist who chisels the marble statue, or paints the famous picture, is generally more recompensed by the knowledge of the success of the work than by the actual pay that he receives.

The satisfaction of knowing that the life work has been a success, that the object sought for has been attained, is, therefore, all the recompense a philanthropist, who devotes his time and his means to the most praiseworthy of human acts and objects, can ever receive, and yet what human being exists who has been a thoughtful reader of human events who would not forego all other praise and ambitions to have the reputation that attaches to John Howard or Florence Nightingale. The transitory power and fame that belongs to the possession of the dust of the earth falls into insignificance when compared with the lasting fame that grows out of their life work. In most people, however, the desire for this recompense is a secondary one, and its pleasures are not fully known. They aim at enough superiority in their work to insure its acceptance and recognition, and with that they rest satisfied. True, as society advances and demands a greater degree of perfection, their aim must rise; but their endeavors will never equal the efforts of those who, aside from all reward, desire and labor, have their work of the best possible quality. Nor do the former, however richly they may be rewarded in money or fame, ever taste the pure delight that is the continual recompense of the latter. Here are, indeed, few things which contribute so largely alike to the happiness and success of each individual and to the welfare of the community as for men and women to pursue excellence in their work for its own sake, and find in that excellence a pleasure which recompenses them for all he toil they have undergone.

TEMPERANCE NOTES.

Contributed by the W. C. T. U. We were forcibly struck with the comparison of Mr. Nash, in his recent talk at the annual meeting of the W. C. T. U., between the teaching of to-day in our public schools and that of fifty years ago. And we believe that the mightier agency for temperance, as well as other education, is in our public schools; particularly is this true where scientific temperance instruction is made by law a part of the curriculum. Our law requires that in all schools supported by public money, physiology be taught with special reference to alcoholic drinks, stimulants and narcotics. By careful watchfulness on the part of our superintendents of this department, this law can be enforced to the letter; for if the teacher neglects or refuses to teach the branch he can be reported forthwith and dealt with as in any other neglect of duty. Therefore our superintendents should visit the schools and ascertain if proper instruction is given in this important subject, for if enforced the good effects of the law are incalculable. It is the belief of the majority of our thinkers that the only solution of the temperance problem is in the education of the masses. The people are slow to act for want of knowledge. We should not neglect the opportunity to press this matter in our public schools.

The Lewiston (Me.) Journal of a recent date says: "All the loan and building associations in Maine are flourishing finely. And they are doing a splendid work for Maine in keeping our money at home and building homes with it. This is the sort of 'rum' which prohibition brings to Maine. It could be endorsed by other state in the union with great complacency."

Forty counties besides 298 magisterial districts of Kentucky, five-eighths of the entire state, are under local prohibition.
