GREENBERRY SMITH'S FORTUNE.

Positive Proof that He Inherited His Brother's Money—Suit Dismissed. Some weeks since suit was commenced in the U. S. circuit court against the heirs of the late Greenberry Smith by his brother and sister, living in the East, for an accounting.

The plaintiffs claimed that Greenberry in 1850 took the property left by his brother Alexander, who died in the Sandwich islands, and conveyed it to his own use, depriving them of their share.

Saturday the suit was dismissed, for the reason that the heirs of Greenberry Smith proved that he came into possession of the property lawfully. They produced a will executed by Alexander Smith at the Sandwich islands in 1850, bequeathing all his property to his brother Greenberry. This will was witnessed by William Stevens and Capt. T. A. Hall, who were with Alexander Smith when he died. These witnesses brought the will and the deal brother's money to Greenberry from the Sandwich islands, and proved the will in the county court of Washington county.

One of the witnesses to the will, Mr. Stevens, is still living, a resident of Walla Walla. He was in Portland last week and identified his signature to the will. When the suit was commenced it was supposed by the plaintiffs that there had been no will. The outcome of this suit shows that it sometimes pays handsomely to save old papers.

THE CITY'S ASSESSMENT.

The Value of City Property and Amount of Taxes as Shown by the Roll for 1888. The tax roll for the city of Albany for the year 1888 has been completed by City Recorder N. J. Henton. It shows a marked increase in the value of property during the year, as exhibited in the footings, which are as follows:

Ant. of real property... \$ 776,881  
Ant. of personal property... 545,065  
Total... \$1,322,546

Exemptions... 32,941  
Total taxable property... \$1,021,906

Ant. taxes at 6 mills... \$6,131.44

Last year the total amount of taxable property was \$900,212, and the amount of taxes was \$4,501.06 making \$1,690.38 more taxes this year than last. From the tax roll and the road tax roll a close estimate of the city's population can be made, which is placed at 3,150.

Died from His Injuries.

Information has been received in this city that K. J. Stewart, the Corvallis painter, who attempted suicide a few days ago at that place, died Sunday from his injuries. It is stated that he had another name, Knight, and that he was at one time special correspondent of the San Francisco Chronicle. He possessed a fine education, and it is a pity that he should have attempted so rash a deed. He became somewhat insane on Wednesday, and made an attempt to run away, getting up in the absence of his nurse and running down stairs from his hotel, and out into the street in a nude state, declaring that he was "wanted by the devil." The exposure when so severely wounded probably hastened his death.

Nearly A Fatal Dose.

At the Dalles, few days ago, the little daughter of W. H. Moody, aged about three years, got a bottle of carbolic acid, and before the mother could take it from her, had innocently swallowed nearly the whole contents. Fortunately, Dr. Gilmer, in his daily visits to one of his patients, passed by the residence and immediately administered the usual antidotes for the poison and an emetic. This circumstance, says the Times-Mountain, and the little girl having eaten a hearty breakfast a short time previously, undoubtedly saved her life. At last accounts the child was doing well, with every prospect of being around in a few days.
