THE SILENT WORLD.

Closing Exercises of the Mute School at Salem—Twenty-Eight Students.

SALEM, April 25.—To-day witnessed the closing of the school year of the Mute school in this city. There were thirteen males and fifteen females in the school at the close of term, from Albany, Eugene, Portland and other portions of Oregon.

Aside from the elementary studies several industries are engaged in, such as broom making, cabinet work, carpenter work, printing, sewing, fancy work and household work, of which the pupils take a good deal.

Hon John Burnett, democratic nominee for supreme judge, resented being called an "office seeker" by the Corvallis Gazette, whereupon that paper made apology as follows: "We were mistaken; it is the office that has been seeking you, as the following will show: In 1862, if we are rightly informed, you ran for state senator against A. G. Hovey and was defeated; in 1864 you ran for district attorney against J. P. Weston and was defeated; in 1866 you ran for county judge against T. Bent (Oleat) and was defeated; in 1868 you ran for presidential elector on the Seymour and Blair ticket, and was defeated; in 1870 you ran for county judge against A. G. Mulkey and was elected; in 1872, while acting as county judge, you ran for congress against Hon. J. G. Wilson and was defeated; in 1874 you ran independent for supreme judge against Mosier and Kelsay and was elected; in 1876 you ran in the democratic state convention for supreme judge and was defeated by J. M. Thompson; in 1878 you ran for state senator against James Chambers and was elected; in 1880 you ran for supreme judge with Prim and Kelly, and you were all three defeated by what was called the boys' ticket, Lord, Watson and Waldo; in 1882 you were appointed supreme judge by Gov. Thayer; in 1886 you ran in the democratic convention for governor and was defeated, but accepted the nomination for district judge and was defeated by Hon. R. S. Bean; and in 1888 you are a candidate for supreme judge. So it appears that office has been seeking you for a long time. It has not always found you, but it has been after you all the same. In fact, it has been hunting you every election for the last twenty-six years, except one, viz.: 1884, and it is possible that the measles frightened it away that year."
