WHEAT STATISTICS.

The total production of wheat in the United States for 1886 is set down by the statisticians of the department of agriculture at Washington at 456,320,000 bushels. Dakota leads with 52,406,000, Indiana is second with 37,828,000, Illinois third with 36,861,000 and Minnesota fourth with 36,299,000. Ohio follows close upon Minnesota and California, at considerable interval, follows Ohio.

The statistician's estimate gives the yield of the Pacific states and territories as follows: California, 30,426,000 bushels; Oregon, 16,100,000; Washington, 8,345,000; Idaho, 1,120,000; Nevada, 111,000. Every one of the states and territories produce wheat, but the yield of some are very small. Massachusetts is credited with but 16,000 bushels, Connecticut with 37,000, and New Hampshire with only 110,000, or just about the same as Nevada. Some of the Southern states produce a good deal of wheat. Tennessee is credited with 9,595,000 bushels, North Carolina with 5,049,000 and Georgia with 2,522,000. The states known formerly as the "border states" produce a great deal of this cereal—thus, Missouri is set down for 27,440,000 bushels, and Kentucky for 11,113,000. Neither New York or Pennsylvania produces so much as Oregon.

It is estimated that 200,162,000 bushels of the crop of 1887 have been or will be consumed in the localities where the wheat was grown, and 256,166,200 bushels have been or will be shipped away. In weight, per bushel, wheat grown on the Pacific coast is heaviest. That of Oregon is 59.7 pounds, that of Washington the same, and that of California a trifle less.

CHARLES DICKENS, son of his father, the English novelist, who is now making the tour of this country, is of the opinion that many Americans, while being familiar with the English novelists and historians, actually needed an introduction to American authors. He found many of the writings of Washington Irving and Nathaniel Hawthorne. Perhaps literary piracy, as it was called, which enables publishers to flood the country with cheap editions of foreign authors, while the works of American writers are protected by copyright, and consequently are among the high priced books, is accountable for much of this condition.

Mr. HENRY LAMB seems to be a public spirited man. He offers prizes of \$50 and \$200 for the best essays on "Practical, Sanitary and Economic Cooking adapted to Persons of Moderate and Small Means," that shall be sent to Dr. Irving A. Watson, Concord, N. H., by September 15, 1888, with the writer's name in a sealed envelope. Dr. Watson is secretary of the American Public Health Association.

THERE have been about 1,000 strikes in the United States in the last fifteen months, of which nearly 100 were entered upon since the beginning of the present year. Presumably, the total number of employees concerned directly in these disturbances was not above 400,000; Bradstreet estimates 340,804 for 1887, with 50,000 to add, for persons who have struck work since January 1st last. Of the latter a great portion are still out.

The world's annual consumption of wheat is estimated at 2,165,000,000 bushels. The California fruit crop this year is said to be enormous.
