WHAT HAS BEEN ACCOMPLISHED.

The recent convocation of the women's congress in Washington brings into prominence the contemplation of the advance that has been made in the forty years of work in the condition and position of women.

The press comment has been as usual sharp upon the action of the women assembled, and of course each individual comment has been marked with the spirit and understanding that actuated the writer. Very many, of course, have tipped their pencil points with the sarcastic ridicule that has ever attended the envenomed handling of the "woman's rights" subject. But with a majority the conclusion has been made that changes in public sentiment have widened and broadened the field of action for women, and that legal enactments have placed her in a much better condition. Take for instance the act granting to women the right to hold as their separate property anything which they owned at the time of their marriage, or of which they became possessed at a later date through inheritance or conveyance from other persons than their husbands, was the first step of a series, taken with fitting deliberation and caution, toward the recognition of woman's identity as an individual, without regard to family ties of blood or wedlock. At the same time a hundred callings which formerly were closed against women on account of the tradition that their sex is weak and incompetent to perform the ordinary duties of bread-winners are now not only opened to them but positively offer a welcome to those who are brave enough to enter. The industrial economies of England and the United States tell the same story of advancement. Women have attained celebrity in the pulpit, at the bar, as practitioners of medicine, in the fine arts and on the press. It would be easy to fill columns with the record of their achievements in various callings to which they have shown themselves admirably adapted, and which once they could not have pursued without unsexing themselves.

Certainly all of this deserves a full recognition and a full meed of praise. It deserves the profound admiration of the nation, for it has been wrought out against adverse circumstances and the most inveterate opposition, and this, too, without war or bloodshed. Many of the most bloody wars of man fail to point to as great results. Indeed, enough is shown to forever shame the use of the gall or sarcastic ridicule for the irrational power of newspaper scribblers.

A FRENCH writer of operatic productions has conceived the idea of antedating all other productions in the plot and accessories of a new opera, and goes clear back to the Homeric "Odyssey" narratives to draw from for the foundation of his work. It is said he will first try his hand upon the episode of Circe. The costumes alone will form an attractive feature of the stage production of his opera.

A RECENTLY published book makes a comparative compilation of passages from the bible and from Shakespeare's writing, showing their complete similarity, and induces therefrom that Shakespeare drew much of his inspiration from the scriptures. That in fact many of the "rare jewels of the sacred book are set in the fine gold of the greatest poet of all time."

The pleasant feature of the republican situation is that, despite a little needless acrimony indulged in by an Indiana, an Illinois or Ohio editor on behalf of the "chosen friend" of each, there is no jealousy or intriguing between candidates or most active friends of candidates. If Sherman be the nominee the friends of Lincoln and Gresham will be his friends and supporters, and without a moment's pause to salve any sore spots. In fact, these gentlemen and their friends are too robust to acquire sore spots by the slight jostlings of preconvention movements, and are too wise and good-natured to strive to inflict them upon others. If Gresham be the nominee the advocates of Sherman and Lincoln and Harrison will become his advocates. And if it should happen to be Allison the Gresham, Sherman and Lincoln men will "come up smiling" to do battle for him. If it should be Lincoln everybody would be a Lincoln man; but that could not be otherwise, for Mr. Lincoln has not an enemy in the world. As for Mr. Depew, if New York should be successful in persuading the convention as to his superior availability, he would get all the republican votes in the country. And so with Harrison, or Busk, or Cullom, or any other whose name is likely to be presented. The republican convention will assemble tinged by the bitterness of "personal following;" there will be an earnest and patient search for the best man and, whether he be found in New York, Illinois, Ohio, Indiana or Iowa, he will be placed on a republican platform and be supported as a republican and a protectionist.
