\$11,250 Received for the Agricultural Station at Corvallis.

On Tuesday Hon. Thos. E. Cauthorn, treasurer of the state board of regents of the agricultural college, received \$11,250 from the treasurer of the United States, being the three payments due Oregon out of the fund to establish experimental stations in connection with the several agricultural colleges of the United States.

Now, then, there is something else to be done. The college building will be completed by the first of June ready to be turned over to the governor, when the state board will enter into full control of the institution.
