THE FARMERS AND MERCHANTS.

The Capital Stock Increased to \$500,000 at a Stockholders Meeting Yesterday.

A special meeting of the stockholders of the Farmers and Merchants Insurance Company was held in this city yesterday afternoon, for the purpose of increasing the capital stock from \$300,000 to \$500,000. There were 1999 votes in the meeting, and by the unanimous voice of the stockholders the capital stock was increased to \$500,000. The steadily increasing business of the company seemed to require this move and it places this sound and reliable corporation in the front rank of Pacific insurance companies. The citizens of Albany have reason to be proud of the Farmers and Merchants.

A New Town.

Lyonville is the name of a new town laid out and platted by J. C. Lyons and his brother, across the river from Melama, on the line of the Oregon Pacific railway. This prospective city of the foothills is in a fine location, to which in time will be tributary a rich section of farming country, already pretty well settled, and there is no reason why a prosperous town cannot grow up there after the completion of the railroad. Mr. Goblet, of this city, surveyed the site and made the plat, which is creditably executed. It is to be hoped Messrs. Lyons will make a grand success of the venture.—Salem Statesman.

The Yaquina Jetty.

The Yaquina Post says: "Fifty or sixty feet of the government jetty, west of the engine house, has been washed out." This was occasioned by the unfinished condition in which the work was left when the appropriation was spent, requiring it to be stopped. It will be difficult to persuade the people who are interested in Yaquina bay that a portion of the much talked of treasury surplus might not have been profitably spent in this work instead of being the same unprotected, to be swept away by the storm and Cleveland's pocket veto of the river and harbor bill.

State Sunday School Convention.

The third annual meeting of the Sunday school workers of this state will be held in the Baptist church, Albany, beginning Tuesday evening, May 22, at 8 o'clock, and closing the following Thursday evening. It is hoped by the executive committee that all the Sunday schools in the state will be represented. An excellent programme has been prepared and it will soon be sent to all localities. The usual reduction of fares by the O. & C. R. R. east and west divisions, Oregon Pacific railway and P. W. V. R. R. has been obtained, and entertainment while at Albany arranged for. Nothing has been left undone to make the convention a grand success, if the attendance is what it ought to be.

Small Fire at Corvallis.

Last Friday afternoon the fire bell rang an alarm and it was soon learned that Max Friendly's saw mill was on fire. The department was hurried to the rescue when the names were subdivided without doing much damage. The roof of the mill caught from sparks from the engine and burned a hole about ten feet long and two or three wide. A very narrow escape.—Corvallis Times.
