H. B. Keniston, of Halsey, has purchased the stock of general merchandise of T. J. Black at that place, and has inaugurated a new method of trade. He pays the return fare of his customers who come on the railroad, and he has made sweeping reduction in price of his entire stock, and is doing a heavy business. He is selling at such unheard of prices that it is said the people go from all parts of the country to trade with him.

Hermann's Reply.

Representative Hermann has received an invitation from the chairman of the prohibition central committee of Oregon, asking him to meet in joint debate Professor Miller, prohibition candidate for congress. Mr. Hermann will reply to this letter, saying that if the invitation was intended as an act of courtesy simply, he appreciated the spirit in which it was sent; but if it was intended to induce him to abandon his professional duties, leaving the state entirely unrepresented upon the floor of the house of representatives, he can only express his amazement that such an invitation should come from the headquarters of a party pretending to have the welfare of the state at heart.

A Slight Explosion.

Yesterday morning as Wm. Humphrey, Western Union telegraph operator, and C. B. Winn, Wells Fargo & Co.'s agent, who occupy the same building, were industriously at work they were startled by an explosion in the stove which blew the doors off and knocked the back out. An examination showed that a rifle cartridge had in some way got into the stove and needed only a hot stove to make an explosion like a young dynamite charge. Fortunately no serious injury was done.

BOARD OF TRADE.

Citizens' Meeting Last Night to Effect an Organization—Committee Appointed.

An enthusiastic meeting of citizens was held at the G. A. R. hall last evening for the purpose of organizing a board of trade.

The meeting was called to order by J. L. Cowan, who moved that Judge J. C. Powell act as chairman of the meeting.

The motion prevailed, and on motion of Dr. J. L. Hill Jay W. Blain was elected secretary.

J. L. Cowan suggested that a committee be appointed to draft a constitution and by-laws to be presented at a future meeting preparatory to permanent organization.

C. E. Wolverton thought Mr. Cowan's suggestion a good one, and asked if the constitution and by-laws should be considered for adoption by a meeting of citizens, or by those only who were to become members of the board of trade.

W. C. Cassell said he thought the committee ought to be composed of men who are to be members of the board of trade, and requested that the secretary read certain information in the way of documents which he had received relative to the organization of such a board.

Dr. G. W. Maston asked if the secretary was in receipt of such information.

Dr. J. L. Hill thought that members only of the board of trade could be members of the committee, and spoke of the advantages of a board of trade.

On motion of J. L. Cowan a committee of seven was appointed to draft a constitution and by-laws for the organization of a board of trade, the same to be presented at a meeting to be held Thursday evening, the chairman of the meeting to be a member of the committee, which was completed as follows:

D. P. Mason moved for a reconsideration of motion fixing the meeting for Thursday evening, changing the time to Wednesday evening. The motion prevailed, and the time of the next meeting was fixed for Wednesday evening, May 9th, at 8 o'clock.

Dr. Hill asked what other business, aside from the drafting of constitution and by-laws, would come within the duties of the committee.

C. E. Wolverton thought the constitution should be adopted by the citizens' meeting Wednesday evening and the permanent organization then effected after the constitution had been subscribed.

J. L. Cowan was of the same opinion.

The secretary then read a communication from the Astoria chamber of commerce.

L. Senders moved that the secretary issue a call for the meeting Wednesday evening to be published in the city papers, which motion prevailed.

The meeting then adjourned to meet Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock to hear the report of the committee and elect a permanent organization.

TO BE REIMBURSED.

Oregon Soon to Receive a Large Sum from Washington.

The act of congress admitting Oregon into the union provided that 5 per centum of the net proceeds of sales of all public lands within the state, after admission, should be paid over to the state.

These payments have been made regularly since 1859, and have been a source of considerable revenue to the state, but in 1885 they ceased.

Becoming cognizant of the government's failure to fulfill its obligation, Gov. Penoyer, some time since, wrote to the comptroller of the U. S. treasury, inquiring into the status of the matter, and has just received the following answer:

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 23.
Governor of Oregon, Salem, Oregon—Sir:—An account has been adjusted between the United States and the state of Oregon, per report No. 42,423, under the fourth section of the act of February 1859, and section 3689 revised statutes for 5 per cent. upon the net proceeds of sales of lands within the limits of the state of Oregon, commencing July 1, 1883, and ending June 30, 1887, inclusive; and there has been found due the state the sum of \$41,628.68. Of this sum \$22,707.13 accrued during the fiscal years 1884 and 1885, and said sum has lapsed into the United States treasury, and has been estimated for appropriation by the present congress.

That portion, viz: \$18,921.55, which accrued in 1886 and 1887, will be forwarded by draft to your order in due course of business. Very respectfully,
