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THE COUNTY JUDGSHIP.

WHEN it is remembered that Judge Whitney, who claims to have administered economy judiciously during his term as county judge, has been instrumental in entailing several costly suits upon Linn county, brought about by his refusal to allow claims, and collected at the expense of the county, the claim of economy for the county does not appear very conspicuously; and if the costs of these suits were footed up, the total would be much larger than the petty little amounts saved by his parsimoniousness. And it might not be out of place to consider that when he was absent in California about a month, leaving the county judge's office vacant, he did not consider that justice to the county demanded at least that he should omit to draw his salary for that period. If he is running on the line of economy he ought not to charge the county for a month's work while he was on a tour to California.

The law requires that the county judge's office shall be kept open all the time for probate business. It was not so kept open in the above instance, neither was it when the present incumbent spent a month or so at Salem when the legislature was in session, lobbying for Mitchell.

A peculiar phase of humanity was lately brought out by an incident which transpired at one of the picnics in the woods near Paris, France. The police inspector was sent to arrest a man known as the Wizard of Montmartre for the illegal practice of medicine. The wizard was reported as a notorious quack. On the appearance of the inspector the wizard produced his diploma, and avowed himself a doctor of the faculty with full right to exercise his profession. He then explained that though he had distinguished himself at his examination, he had starved as a professional, but that, having set up as a quack, he had made his fortune and had now amassed \$80,000. The people avoided him as a doctor, but rushed to him as a quack. This certainly is a rare exhibition of the fact that the people dearly like to be thoroughly humbugged.

The present condition of Europe it is said gives a better opportunity to Russia to exercise her raiding policy than ever before, and her activity in military equipment is said to indicate a desire to engage in that avocation. Germany is in a worry over her emperor's condition and England is distracted by home rule dictats and unprepared for war talk. If Russia wants to strengthen her muddled finances by appropriating new and rich territories now seems to be a propitious time for the venture.

MORE FACTS FOR VOTERS.

To the Editor of the Herald:
The Daily Democrat, it seems, is an apologist for the county court. It says the writer of the letter in the Herald might have told his reader, if he was so earnest in search of truth, that all witnesses in criminal cases swear to their claims before they are presented to the court, and it was upon the affidavit of this witness that Messrs. Brandon, Miller and Whitney allowed this claim. Many of your readers, and those of the Democrat, will no doubt be surprised at this disclosure. The writer knows many men who have failed to obtain a verdict against the county, when they were verified by the oath of the claimant before the clerk. The

court sometimes, holding that the law fixed the compensation, and the court could allow only such compensation; and again ruling that the law was silent, hence the court could allow nothing. When the letter and spirit of the law are plain, the court has no right to be governed by the oath of the claimant. It was plain, in the instance cited by your correspondent, that the law made no provision for the compensation allowed by the county court to Mr. Harmon.

The Democrat is right in supposing that Mr. Whitney was meant, but wrong in saying the commissioners are equally as culpable as Whitney, unless it is willing to admit that they know the law as well as Whitney, and if he makes that admission, your correspondent would urge that as a reason why he should not be elected to the judgeship, for if he did not know the law not only makes no provision for the payment of such fees, but provides in a very explicit manner what the compensation shall be—two dollars per day for each day's attendance, and ten cents in going to and returning from the place where the service is performed—he lacks the necessary qualification. If he did know the law, then your correspondent would say, his dishonesty is a good reason why he should not be trusted when he can squander the people's money.

The commissioners are not to be blamed with the county judge. No one who knows how the county judge's office touching the county judge's office we have heard them say to the judge when a question of law was sent for his consideration of the court, "You are a lawyer and we are not." This writer once asked Commissioner Brandon if he had ever examined a law touching a certain matter which had been passed upon by the court, and he answered me, "No, I never did. I am a lawyer, and we leave these questions to Judge Whitney."

Perhaps the people would like to know why Whitney allowed the witnesses who went to Portland in the mortgage tax cases, in the federal court, \$2 instead of a dollar per diem, and ten cents a mile each way instead of five cents, as the law provides. And perhaps the Democrat will make excuses for the county judge drawing his salary of \$75 during a jurisdicton tour in California for over a month since he has been in office. Perhaps this blunder will be charged to the commissioners also. It certainly would not be fair to do so, because they could scarcely have compelled Whitney against his will to accept it.

If the Democrat takes up the cudgels for Whitney, your correspondent will at some future time ask some explanations touching some bridges Whitney promised when he wished the suffrages of the people, when he was a candidate for county judge four years ago. Let Whitney rise and explain.
