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A WARNING TO WORKINGMEN

Mr. E. A. Hartshorn, one of the board of managers of the American protective tariff league, made one of his characteristic and effective addresses before the Boston paper trade association last week. A few of his telling sentences convey his meaning in a way no one can fail to understand. He said, in closing:
'I am informed that there are present to-night some laboring men, men who work for wages. I am especially proud, as a defender of the American standard of wages, living and self-government, to meet you here, and to confess my inability to single you out from the merchants and manufacturers present. It is a boast that the citizen of no other country can make, that in the churches, at the concert or the lecture, the employee and the employer, the housewife and the housemaid, cannot be singled out by the apparel worn.

'The protection or destruction of domestic industries concerns especially the workingmen of America. The demoralizing competition of unorganized labor at home is in significant when measured by the ill effect of open competition with the products of scant-clad, ill-fed foreign labor.

'Would you stand guard 365 days to prevent wild beasts from devouring your defenseless offspring, and on the 25th day deliberately cast them into the jaws and claws of destruction? You do the exactly parallel when you stand by the American standard of wages, living and self-government until election day, and then favor free foreign trade. In your praiseworthy desire to possess your own homes, you have incurred an indebtedness. Would you, by a stroke of law, double the amount? You accomplish the same result by favoring free foreign trade which will shrink your earnings one-half in a twelvemonth, but which will not shrink the mortgages on your homes. I warn you to shun the demagogue who would lull you into the decision that tariff for protection concerns only your employer.

'Be not deceived. The free foreign traders are playing with your destinies as recklessly as boys play with topknots. Under the pretext of reducing surplus revenue, they are straining every nerve to degrade our labor to the European level, and unless vigorous protests are hurled into Washington by laboring men from every industrial center, the effort will be successful. Put no confidence in those who tell you that neither party desires industrial legislation. If for political effect the Mills tariff bill is passed in the lower house, with the expectation that it will be stopped in the senate, it will pass in the senate, and the president must sign it; and then will come its dire consequences, falling most heavily upon the workingmen of America.'

Gov. Hill, of New York, is in a pickle. In one of his messages he said: 'The evils of intemperance are not hid in a corner; they cannot be concealed; to all they are patent, and to none more patent than to those who, as public servants, have to deal in any degree with the criminal law. It is not, and it cannot be denied, that society is injured, that the state receives harm, and the character of a people debased by the excessive, unregulated and indiscriminate use of intoxicants. These evils exist in every city and in every town; these injuries touch both rich and poor. Whatever measures to prevent the sale of such goods may be deemed wise and proper, they

could be applied wherever the evil aimed at exists; applied alike to country and to city. Such laws should be no respecters of persons or of localities.' The legislature has passed a high license bill, and his democratic constituents are beseeching him to veto it, while the friends of the measure point to the above words and say stick to your promise, sir.

The publication of Ignatius Donnelly's book, in which he strives to annihilate the fair fame of Shakespeare by a pretended discovery of a hidden meaning in the plays that reveal the fact that they were written by Bacon and that Shakespeare was a fraud, will not establish either fame or fortune for its author, but rather the contrary, as it should. This generation has very little to do with the man Shakespeare, in fact nothing whatever. He has passed beyond the pale of earthly action. The Shakespeare that we have to do with is the living spirit of the grandest poetry and sublimest conceptions of human character that have ever passed into literary productions, and that Shakespeare will live and extend his influence and power as long as printer's ink can be employed to multiply copies of the wonderful plays, in spite of all the Donnellys in the world who try to build a cheap fame by smirching grand names with defaming mud.

Perhaps the severest criticism upon the president for the appointment of Judge Melville W. Fuller, of Chicago, as chief justice of the United States, comes from the New York World, the leading democratic paper of the country. It thinks the president could have found a better known man, one who was already an eminent jurist and distinguished lawyer, as well as a democrat. Perhaps, however, Pulitzer had not investigated the situation and became aware of the difficulties to fill the bill as well as President Cleveland had. The majority of the press of the country seem to think that the president performed the job remarkably well.

It is perhaps a significant fact that just at present the majority of the press of the United States that are urging that Blaine is the one to be nominated at the republican national convention at Chicago, are those that sail under democratic colors. They appear to have more anxiety about the matter than do the republican papers.
