The telegraph relates a story to the effect that a Mr. John Gayne, a wealthy Chicagoan, who over a year ago successfully defended himself from the charge of having ruined a young girl, and procured judgment for \$10,000 against the witnesses for conspiracy, has now procured the imprisonment of Mrs. Beckers, who was one of the witnesses, and her two children, one and three years old, because she was too poor to make payment.

An Eastern exchange says very truthfully: "Farmers often make too little distinction between kid glove farming and book farming. The farmer who is afraid of soiling his hands, dwells on high sounding impracticable theories, neglects his farm and allows it to grow more weeds than grain, is far different from the farmer who not only reads but works, puts in practice what he preaches, plans his work intelligently and makes farming a source of pleasure and profit. THE REPUBLICANS UNITED.

Hon. Geo. H. Williams on being asked yesterday what he considered the outlook for the republican party in this state the coming election, said: "In any canvass I have made in this state I have never found the republicans more united and enthusiastic than at this time. They are unanimous in supporting the state nominations, and generally, as far as I can learn, there is very little dissatisfaction with the county nominations. In my opinion the democrats are making special effort to elect their legislative ticket so as to secure the United States Senator, and are organizing third parties in counties where the republicans have small majorities, but the republicans are awake to their efforts and they will be unsuccessful.

"I have conversed with a number of representative republicans in regard to their preference for a nomination at the Chicago convention, and although some are quite friendly to Blaine I believe the prevailing sentiment among the republicans is that the nomination of Judge Gresham is the best nomination that could be made by that convention, and I concur in that opinion."

"What is your idea about the prohibition vote?" "My opinion is that the whole vote will not be any larger than it was two years ago, and it is doubtful if it is as large. A number of avowed prohibitionists in Clackamas county, where I have just been, say that they will support the republican ticket."
