EDITORIAL NOTES.

O'BRIEN, the Irish editor, is again in hot water, with the prospect of passing the summer in jail.

The Mississippi river is on a rampage just now, getting up high water. It shut off the lights from Dubuque, Iowa, the other evening by flooding the gas main.

PROBABLY in a short time an innumerable number of certificate holding Chinamen will be flocking to this coast for admittance under the new treaty. The matter of making certificates will be just in their line.

It is said the Russian persecution of the Jewish people has caused a hegira to the city of Jerusalem, and that its Jewish population has increased since 1880 from five to thirty thousand, and become a lively business center.

It is interesting to read that just at this time when political party interests is demanding wool, lumber, etc., Australia is putting on a duty on all timber shipped from Oregon of one shilling per one hundred superficial feet. That would certainly be fine for no only Australia wool to come in free but for a heavy duty upon what timber is shipped into that country from this state.

Gen. Lish Applegate in his speech last night read a letter, which is published elsewhere, of Andrew Jackson on the necessity and constitutionality of a protective tariff for American industries. The democratic farmers of Oregon will not be slow in discerning which is better democratic doctrine, Andrew Jackson or Cleveland's free trade balderdash.

One of the scenes accompanying the high water in the Mississippi river, was in the city of Alexandria, Missouri, which was submerged entirely and all the business suspended. The water stood from three to seven feet deep and the inhabitants all moved up stairs, until the "shower" should be over. The river was seven miles wide.

The faith cures and the so-called christian science seems to be leading a larger number of dupes into its following than ever before, in spite of the many deaths and suicidal endings that has been caused by their practice. Faith may cure a hypochondriac, but it cannot reduce a fractured bone or take up a severed artery. It requires works not faith in such cases.

The committee on ventilation and acoustics have fallen upon a perfectly effective way of reducing the surplus in the treasury. They have concluded to report favorably upon a bill appropriating \$150,000 to encourage the building of an air ship. The plans for the proposed ship are furnished by a Chicago man, and the bill was introduced by a Chicago congressman, partly as a joke, and to get rid of the impotencies of the air ship inventor. Of course if the bill passes innumerable other similar navigation castles in the air will bob up serenely for a like \$150,000 help to put in operation.

In Clatsop county the democrats seem to be preparing for a futile scheme of election contest in the next session of Oregon's legislative assembly. In the redistricting bill which was adopted at the last session, Clatsop county was made a senatorial district by itself, it formerly having been districted with Columbia and Tillamook. J. H. D. Gray, who was elected senator for the old district, is a resident

of Clatsop county, and the term of office for which he was elected does not expire until 1890. To cover such cases as this the act contains this provision: "Senators holding over representing districts composed of more than one county, shall, when the districts have been changed by this act, be considered senators of the districts created by this act in which they reside." Plainly Capt. Gray is still senator of Clatsop county, and the republicans so construed the case and made no nomination for the place. The democrats, however, have nominated Dr. Page, and, if he is voted for, will of course be elected, as no other candidate is in nomination. The query naturally arises, does the democratic state party managers contemplate making an attempt to gain control of the legislature by such methods, or are the democrats of Clatsop to be reconciled among the Rip Van Winkle's, who have not awakened to the fact that the state has been redistricted.
