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THE QUESTION OF EMPLOYMENT FOR WOMEN.

No other social problem bears with it the importance and difficulties that does the one of placing within the reach of gentleness the means of being independently employed. The Chicago Inter-Ocean says: "The London Spectator does not take so cheerful a view of the woman question in England as do the eminent and eloquent Mrs. Chant and Mrs. Dilke. Instead of assuming that America is behind the mother country, from the feminine point of view, it paints a picture which has no counterpart in the United States, except, perhaps, in certain localities. The Spectator is especially solicitous about what it terms 'necessitous gentlewomen.' It even doubts if they are not to be pitied for their intelligence. If they were uneducated they could engage in whatever menial service came to hand, but being genteelly bred they are barred out of that sort of employment. The Spectator mournfully asks, 'What is to be the end of all this?' Without attempting to crack this nut, we would suggest that the inequality, numerically speaking, of the two sexes stands in the way of a satisfactory adjustment of woman's place in British society. There are 800,000 more women than men in the United Kingdom. Emigration is the explanation. In the United States, on the contrary, the men exceed the women to about the same extent. If these two great English-speaking nations could only 'pool their issues' the thing would be evened up, and the 'visible supply' of splinters would be reduced. In this country the troublesome 'surplus' is cash in the national treasury, instead of 'necessitous gentlewomen.' Our problem is easily enough solved, but there is one of the toughest conundrums of political economy. 'The great shop keepers,' we are told, 'could fill their establishments with the daughters of clergymen, country solicitors, doctors, and superior clerks, and then leave a kind of worldful begging for admittance outside.' This being the case, it is not at all surprising that the Spectator is apprehensive of a 'serious demoralization of educated women from the desperate desire for a livelihood seen almost to be unattainable.' It seems to be on the verge of 'doubt' if the majority of gentlewomen without means would not be better for ignorance, as leaving them better able to give up their grade at once, and join the class of the workingwomen, for for whose labor there is a great demand.' No doubt there is a great deal of suffering and anxiety among American women of education who are obliged to support themselves, in whole or in part, but if any one journal should do so much as suggest that they would be better off if fit for nothing better than scullions the public would set the editor down as a hopeless crank. There are many things to which a young woman of education can turn with a reasonable hope of a comfortable support in remuneration for her labors. The American, man or woman, has much greater skill than the English in self-adjustment to circumstances, whether adverse or prosperous. The necessities must not only be ready to do whatever comes to hand, but alert to seek out new ways of industry. In this country the women are continually widening the scope of female energy by dint of their enterprise and fertility of invention, and herein they set an example their transatlantic sisters would do well to emulate."

SECRETARY BAYARD, in making demands upon the French government that procured the release of two naturalized American citizens, who had been conscripted into the French army, says: "The government of the United States holds that a decree of naturalization granted by it to a native of France is not open to impeachment by the French government, either in the executive or judicial branch, and if it is claimed to have been impermissibly issued the remedy is by application to the department of state. If the objection to forced military service is based upon an assumption that these are not citizens of the United States, this department asks their immediate release and for proper compensation for the losses caused by their detention. It cannot be admitted that American citizens, not charged with any crime, should be detained under arrest a single day after their proofs of citizenship have been presented. In cases like this the United States can never admit the propriety of submitting to the ordinary delays of judicial action." The firm demand secured the immediate action of the French officials, and shows that it is only essential to make straightforward and unyielding diplomatic claims to have our inherent rights respected by all nations. There is one peculiar assumption in the secretary's words as quoted above, and that is contained in the sentence, "and if it is claimed to have been impermissibly issued the remedy is by application to the department of state." If there is anything in these words, it indicates that the department of state would investigate the "improvident" issuing of naturalization papers, that is that it has power to go back of the courts and decide whether papers are legal or not. Is the department of state clothed with legal authority to annul or review the acts of the courts of our country.
