NOTINGS ABOUT TOWN.

SHAMEFUL TREACHERY.

The "Democrat" Accuses Capable Officials of an Attempt to Debauch the County. The State Rights Democrat of this city, in its desire to manufacture cheap political capital, has gone to the extent of insinuating that the sheriff and clerk of Linn county, both staunch democrats, have only been prevented from robbing the county treasury by the superhuman efforts of J. J. Whitney, present county judge.

This of course is done through a desire to make votes for Judge Whitney, but such a dishonest and shameful piece of business will not be tolerated by the intelligent voters of Linn county. The article referred to pretends to be a comparison of the volume of the business in the sheriff's office of Linn and Marion counties, and after swelling the amount of sheriff's fees in Marion county by adding costs in the Saunders and Mattie Allison cases, which were actually paid by Linn county, the Democrat makes this stunning statement:

"No other accounting for this remarkable discrepancy can be made except that Judge Whitney has constantly kept a continual watch upon the financial interests of the county. The amount paid the sheriff in Marion makes things look suspicious at least, both for the court and sheriff. Let the voters of Linn be glad that their interests have been so safely guarded by Judge Whitney."

This in the face of the statement that this same alleged robbery would have occurred in Linn county, had it not been for the continual watchfulness of Judge Whitney, can only be taken as a direct accusation against J. P. Galbraith, county clerk, and D. S. Smith, sheriff of the county. If Judge Whitney is the instigator of this article he ought to be resigned to obloquy for attempting to make a showing of economy by insinuating dishonest motives to capable officials of his own party, or if the article containing the attack was simply the effect of the pen of the editor of the Democrat Mr. Whitney ought to rise and explain.

Information was received in this city yesterday morning of a serious accident which occurred at Seio early yesterday morning. Frank Mack while out hunting placed his lighted pipe in his coat pocket which contained several loaded shells. One of the shells became ignited from the fire in the pipe and exploded, shooting off one of his fingers and inflicting a serious wound in the abdomen. It was thought the brass portion of the shell was blown into the abdomen.

Medical assistance was at once summoned, and it was hoped the injuries would not prove fatal. THE GOLDENDALE FIRE. Further Particulars of the Sweeping Away of the Entire Town.

Much interest was manifested yesterday morning when the Herald's dispatches were read, giving the account of the burning of Goldendale, W. T. The following additional particulars have been learned: The entire business portion of the town is destroyed, and the loss will reach \$200,000. The disposition among property owners and merchants almost without exception, is "to stay with the town."

All the stores being destroyed, the town was practically without food, except that which happened to be on hand in the dwellings which did not burn. The people went without supper Sunday night. The board of trade of Portland will appoint a committee to solicit funds for the sufferers by the fire. The people are literally burned out of "house and home." The school house fortunately escaped the general destruction, and is crowded with the homeless. About thirty-five families are in a state of utter destitution, having lost everything.

ANOTHER RAILROAD BRANCH.

Petition for the Extension of the Lebanon Branch to Seioville—A Good Scheme. A petition is being circulated and generally signed by business men of this city, asking the Southern Pacific railroad company to extend the Lebanon branch of the O. & C. railroad to Seioville, a distance of 3 1/2 miles.

The soda springs at Seioville are fast becoming a popular summer resort, and the travel thitherward from different parts of the country is large. The extension of the Lebanon branch to that place would be attended by no difficulties and light expense, as the country is level and there are no streams to cross. The advantage gained would be mutual, as people from all parts of the country could go and come when they pleased by rail direct, connecting at this city with either the O. & C. or the Oregon Pacific trains, and the traffic of that branch would be greatly increased, as a rich country would be brought into railroad communication with the city, and the crowds of people who visit these springs would form a lively passenger business.

It is a desirable undertaking and the branch ought to be built, and probably will be. The question of constructing a branch of the Narrow Gauge line from Spicer to this city is also being agitated. The Narrow Gauge in the upper portion of the valley is now practically useless and this would make it of some advantage to the people along the route, and would add somewhat to the business of Linn's metropolis.

FROM THE STATE CAPITAL.

Died From Injuries—Appointment at the Asylum—Measles at the Penitentiary.

Salem, May 16.—The man Bryan who was fatally injured by being thrown from his horse near Silverton Saturday evening, died Sunday night.

APPOINTMENT AT THE ASYLUM.

Gus Newell, of East Portland, has been appointed by Dr. Lane as steward of the asylum, vice M. G. Wilkins, whose resignation it will be remembered was requested several weeks since. Newell entered upon the discharge of his duties this morning.

MEASLES AT THE PENITENTIARY.

A case of measles has broken out at the penitentiary, the patient being a convict lately from Umatilla county. It is probable the epidemic will go the rounds of the convicts. Both measles and scarlet fever have disappeared from the asylum and visitors are admitted as formerly.

A COWARDLY MURDER.

On Saturday morning, May 5, an atrocious murder was committed twenty-seven miles east of Burns, in Grant county. James Bright was returning from the railroad with a load of freight for Modley Bros., and just as the team had come to a small grade an assassin fired a 44 Winchester, the ball passing through the body from the right side, killing the victim instantly.

Then the murder attached a rope to the dead man's feet dragged the body nearly a quarter of a mile off the road and buried it beneath the rocks. The team stayed along the road, and was discovered by Messrs. Clark and Worthington, two Portland druggists, who were on their way to Burns.

They reported the facts, and the facts, and the whole country is out looking for the murderer. The general opinion is that Bright was killed for his money, as he was known to have had considerable before he started away from home.

Oregon State Sunday School Convention.
