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SCIENTIFIC SCRAPS.

Sometimes the pressure of an artesian flow of water results from a gas pressure instead of from a high head of water. Dakota, for instance, has several artesian wells 1000 feet deep, with 150 to 180 pounds pressure, but there are no high places nearby to give this head of water.

A powerful disinfectant, adapted to all purposes, has been obtained in Paris from coal oil. It is a syrupy brown liquid of a not disagreeable odor, resulting from a peculiar saponification of the oil by a caustic soda. It destroys mites and fungus on trees, and sponging with a weak solution keeps flies from horses.

It is found that smoke, as it issues from the muzzle of a heavy gun, can be almost instantaneously precipitated by means of a simple electrical apparatus. The invention is based upon the researches of Professor Lodge in the action of electricity upon floating dust and vapor, and it should be of considerable military value.

To restore the luster of dead silver work, gilt clock cases, etc., dissolve one ounce of cyanide of potassium in one quart of pure water, empty into a bottle and label it "poison." When to be used place the article in an earthen vessel, cover it over with the solution and in five minutes the lusterless appearance will be removed. Preserve the fluid for future use.

The power of various explosives has been calculated to be equivalent to the following pressures, the figures giving tons per square inch: Emmenite, a new explosive for which important advantages are claimed in addition to great power, 283; nitro-glycerine, 264; explosive gelatine, 253; forcite, 250; oxonite, 249; piculalite, 203; gun cotton, 198; dynamite, 144; atlas, 133; rock, 117; roburite, 24; blasting powder, 23.

The government of Egypt has been persuaded to make surveys which prove the existence of a depressed region nearly sixty miles long by twenty miles wide, reaching a depth of 250 to 300 feet below high Nile. This depression has for several years been held by Mr. D. Cope Whitehouse to be the site of the wonder artificial Lake Moeris described by Herodotus—fictitiously many have believed—with a circumference of 450 miles. The interest at last aroused in Egypt makes it probable that the Nile will soon be admitted to this valley by a canal eleven miles long. The creation or restoration of this great artificial lake will give fertility to a wide area, and will reduce the annual inundations of the Nile, while storing water to replenish the river in dry seasons.

Materials for the painter's colors—animal, vegetable and mineral—come from many lands. The cochineal insects furnish the gorgeous carmines, and crimson, scarlet and purple lakes; sassa is the inkly fluid by which the cuttlefish conceals itself; ivory black and bone black are made from ivory chip; and Prussian blue results from the fusion of impure potassium carbonate with such animal refuse as horse's hoofs. The vegetable lakes are derived from roots, barks and gums; lamp black is from vine charcoal; lamp black is resinous soot; turkey red is made from the madder plant of Hindostan; gamboge, from the yellow sap of a Siamese tree; Indian ink, a Chinese secret, is probably made from camphor; mastic is from a tree of the Grecian archipelago; bistre is the soot of wood-ashes. A natural earth from Sienna, Italy, furnishes raw and burnt sienna; and raw and burnt umber are from an earth of Umbria. Real ultramarine is obtained from the precious lapis lazuli; Chinese white is from zinc; scarlet is iodide of mercury, and carbinar, or native vermilion, is from quicksilver ore.

The San Francisco Call's Views on the Wool Question.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 17.—The Call has the following editorial today: "A Democratic canvass is being conducted in Oregon on the free wool basis. An Oregon contemporary calls attention to the fact that four years ago the Democratic complaint was that the tax on foreign wool was not high enough. The California State Democratic platform then declared that 'the present tariff on wool is an unjust discrimination against that great industry, and we denounce the same, and demand a restitution of the tariff of 1867.'
